

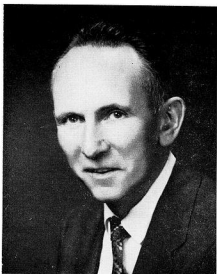
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# DEDICATION

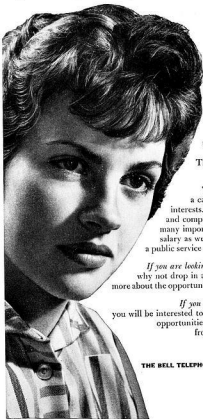

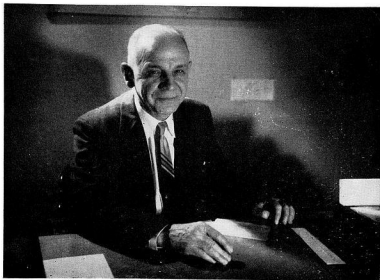

In the year 1948, when the Council of Nations recognized the existence of a tiny republic within its midst, the State of Israel was born. Simultaneously, the dark and dangerous Arab Sea rushed in upon her, but was miraculously repelled by moral and spiritual stamina rather than material or physical strength; for the new land had few military arms and was startlingly outnumbered by forty to one. Today, eleven years later, Israel is a small, nevertheless thriving, industrial, maritime democracy, shining forth from the chaotic, tempestuous sea that continually besieges her.

What is Israel's purpose and its meaning? Its aim is simply to maintain peace, independence, and a good life for its citizens. To do this is by no means an easy task. Both Israel's young men and her young women go

through a military training period at eighteen years of age. Her economic growth is hindered tremendously by the enormous cost of defence. Israel refuses to purchase arms from Communist countries, as her antagonists have done, but at the same time, although remaining true to democracy and the West, she receives little help from the western countries. The great powers are faced with a dilemma: whether to heed the voice of Justice to the struggling nation, or the call of rich Arab oil and political influence in the Middle East. Nor can she receive aid from the smaller countries that either stand along behind the powers or wish to retain their status as mediators. Because of this situation, we find that the two million Israelis make the most of the little they have; everything is intensive rather than extensive.

However, Israel still relies on financial support from the nine million other Jews scattered around the world, five million of whom live in the United States and another hundred fifty thousand in Canada. These people, Israel dear, as she is the Jewish Homeland, which the Hebrew people had been previously lacking for so long a millennia. It gives them a sense of pride to know that the land of their origin, the land that was the seedbed of the heart of the world, sacred to Christian, Jew, and Mohammedan alike, is alive and full of vigor again. Its culture and glorious heritage are revived; Hebrew, the tongue of the Holy Scriptures, is no longer dead, but spoken by the newsboy, the soldier, the actor.

The land of Israel itself, with its strange combination of the modern and western, and the archaic and oriental, is exquisitely beautiful. On the coast are the dazzling white city of Haifa, overlooking a purple Mediterranean bay, and the bustling, sunny metropolis of Tel Aviv. Looking eastward, the solemn, venerable, and glorious city of Jerusalem is to be found amidst the rolling hills. The south consists of the romantic Negev, with its fascinating Dead Sea. The parched land is now experiencing a renaissance through fantastic irrigational projects injecting water into the veins of the earth. The Negev is rich with archaeological and mineral treasures, most of which are still unexplored. Besides the beauty of the land, the Israelis' courage, unusual optimism, and warm hospitality make Israel a tourist's paradise.

Israel is a land of steaming politics, of socialism and conservatism, of cities and agricultural colonies, of traditional religion and agnosticism, of the past and of the future. It is a land of many contrasts and paradoxes, and the achievements made in Israel's young life of eleven years are absolutely amazing. That a virtually dead city was reanimated and rebuilt in so short a time is truly wondrous. I have cast but a slight and dim light on the nature of Israel, for although she is small, she is still very large. She is an endless and captivating land, full of ancient glory, history, religion, and a subtle charm. Israel symbolizes the "eternal light," although it has flickered down to nothingness at times, there has always been enough life left in it to blaze in brilliant conflagration.

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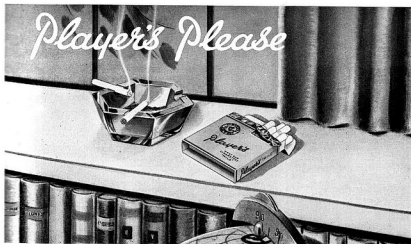
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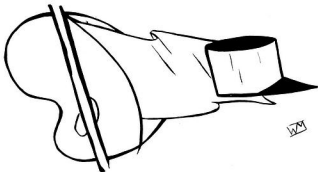
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## ACTIVITES DU "CERCLE FRANÇAIS"

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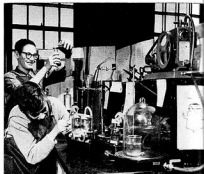

## SCIENCE FAIR

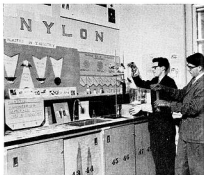
On March 10 Monklands High School held its first annual Science Fair. Preparations for the Fair started shortly after the beginning of the second term. Exhibits were displayed in the Science, Biology, Chemistry and Physics Laboratories; a total of 45 entries involving approximately 100 exhibitors.

The President of the Science Clubs served as the Executive Committee: Lorne Ruby, Mark Sokoloff, Irving Fox, and Harold Blond, of the Biology, Chemistry, Physics (PSSC) and General Science Clubs, respectively. The members of the Science Department acted as an Advisory Committee: Miss Grant, Mrs. Macey, Mr. Levin, Mr. Morris, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Stephen (Co-ordinator). The Judges were under the direction of Mr. W. Price, CIL; Dr. R. D. Gibbs, Professor of Botany, McGill University; Dr. S. Madras, Head of Chemistry Department, Sir George Williams University; and Dr. J. W. Tomecko, Educational Relations Manager, CIL.

The Science Fair was very successful and the pupils and parents were quick to congratulate all those who took part or who worked for its production. A large and unexpected interest was shown by other schools in the Greater Montreal area and from schools off the island of Montreal, because while Science Fairs are common in the USA and other provinces of Canada, this was the first Fair in the province of Quebec. Consequently, because of its originality, the M.H.S. Science Fair received publicity from many unexpected sources — C.B.C.'s Metro News Edition, Dr. Emerson of the Chemical Institute of Canada and Dr. H. Favre of the University of Montreal representing the Canadian Fairs Council, Ottawa.

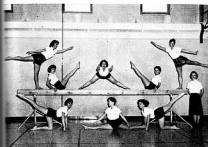

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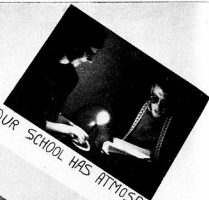
