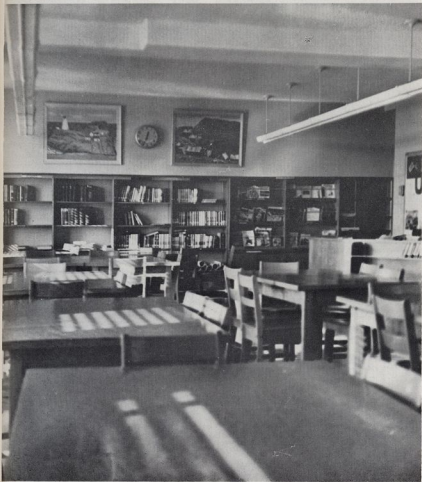

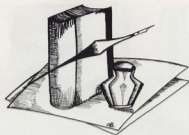

CHINESE FESTIVALS

The Dragon Boat Festival, held on June 17, is also highly regarded. This originated with the suicide of a great statesman, Wa New, who jumped into a river because his king refused to accept his advice. Thus this festival became the memorial day of the death of Wa New. On that day rice cakes in triangular shapes are eaten by people to commemorate his sacrifice. These cakes also are dropped into the rivers to prevent the fish from approaching his body. Dragon Boat races are held on the river for the same purpose as the rice cakes.

The Mid-Autumn Festival, on September 24, originated from an old legend that a beautiful queen, after taking some magic medicine, fled to the moon because of her disapproval of her husband's cruelty. On this memorial day, cakes in moon shapes are eaten by the people. Dragon lanterns are also carried by the children on the streets creating a gay and colourful scene, and people enjoy gazing at the moon where the queen was hidden.

These festivals, celebrated by the Chinese people to commemorate the sacrifice of a national hero, not only provide a gay time, but help to drive away the evil spirits for the following year.

THE CEREMONY OF PASSOVER

For three thousand years the Ceremony of Passover has been celebrated by the Jewish people in order to remind them of the period when their ancestors were slaves in Egypt, and to commemorate their liberation from bondage.

During the service of Passover everyone relaxes in his or her chair. Each action and each prayer recalls some phase of the harsh treatment endured by the Israelites at the hands of the Egyptians for they did not have time even to sit while they ate, much less to lean back and relax.

The father of the house first blesses the wine, and then ceremoniously washes his hands. A plate of bitter is prepared and everyone eats of it in memory of all the deplorable times our people experienced. The three matzahs, which form part of the celebration, are set upon the table. The middle one is broken in half. This originally was done to assure that some matzah be left for the end of the meal. Now this unleavened bread is hidden for the children to find. If it is found, the child can demand a handsome reward. If the parents refuse to grant this, the child does not have to give the matzah back. However, without this matzah the service cannot proceed, and so the parents are compelled to give the child his desire. Then the beautiful blessings and prayers of the Passover service are intoned, and everybody washes his hands. The first matzah is broken, and all partake of it with the bitter herbs.

The "seder" meal, as it is called, is served, and everyone eats amid great celebration. When the meal is over, the piece of matzah which has been hidden, is eaten. Grace is then said, and songs are sung. According to Jewish tradition, the service thus performed is "acceptable to God."

This celebration of the Passover ceremony is a heritage of the Jewish past, and will continue to be handed down to forthcoming generations, as one of the most cherished rites of their faith.

L'EDUCATION EN FRANCE

Il y a deux écoles d'enseignement en France: l'enseignement public et l'enseignement privé. L'enseignement privé, qui est surtout catholique, peut avoir ses propres programmes, mais ses élèves doivent passer les mêmes examens que ceux des écoles publiques. Les examens et les programmes sont fixés par le Ministère de l'Éducation Nationale qui est au sommet du système public. L'enseignement public est le plus important et est fortement centralisé. L'état contrôle toutes les écoles et les universités et nomme tout le personnel enseignant. Au Canada ce sont les nombreuses commissions scolaires dans chaque province qui contrôlent l'éducation.

En France l'enseignement primaire est obligatoire de six à quatorze ans. C'est presque la même chose au Canada. Il est gratuit en France mais pas au Canada. Je pense que l'éducation devrait être gratuite au Canada parce que c'est le devoir de l'état d'éduquer bien ses enfants et ses citoyens. C'est extrêmement important dans ce monde aujourd'hui. Il est laïque en France mais pas au Canada. Je pense que l'éducation devrait être laïque dans un pays qui est vraiment démocratique.

Seulement les élèves les plus doués peuvent entrer dans l'enseignement secondaire, donné dans les lycées. Ils entrent à l'âge de douze ans et doivent réussir dans toutes les matières. L'enseignement est divisé en deux sections: la section classique et la section moderne. La section classique met l'accent sur l'étude des matières littéraires et des langues mortes; tandis que la section moderne met l'accent sur les sciences et les langues vivantes. Les autres matières sont les mêmes pour les deux sections.

Une heure de gymnastique et deux heures d'activités en plein air par semaine sont obligatoires. C'est plus qu'au Canada, mais un élève travaille six ou sept heures par jour aussi, plus qu'au Canada et il a congé le jeudi et le samedi après-midi. Les grandes vacances scolaires sont à peu près les mêmes qu'au Canada. La France ne met pas l'accent sur les sports mais elle croit que ceux-ci sont nécessaires. Je pense que la préoccupation des examens devrait dominer comme en France parce que c'est le but le plus important de l'école.

A la fin des études du lycée l'élève subit un examen écrit et un examen oral qui sont très difficiles. S'il réussit à tous les examens il obtient le diplôme de bachelier qui est nécessaire pour entrer à l'université ou dans les grandes écoles comme Saint-Cyr et l'Ecole Polytechnique.

A l'université les examens sont même plus difficiles et en général au moins cinquante pour cent des candidats échouent. Cependant, les droits d'inscription sont très modiques: à peu près dix à vingt dollars. Alors pour réussir à l'université en France on n'a pas besoin de beaucoup d'argent — seulement beaucoup d'intelligence et de persévérance.

LA BIOGRAPHIE D'UN GRAND CANADIEN

On a dit que Stephen Leacock représente "le paradoxe qui est le Canada". Il n'est pas né au Canada mais en Angleterre, en 1869. Cependant, on l'appelle Canadien car il n'a demeuré en Angleterre que sept ans; puis il est venu ici. La famille s'est établie en Ontario. C'était grâce à la mère que l'enfance de Leacock était heureuse, car le père n'a pas réussi avec toutes les entreprises qu'il essayait et aussi il a traité la famille un peu mal. Enfin le père les a abandonnés et Stephen a décidé qu'il devrait aider la famille à faire vivre lui-même.

Il fréquentait l'Université de Toronto mais il lui semblait qu'il n'y apprenait rien, alors il a quitté ses études et a commencé à enseigner. En 1900 il s'est marié avec Beatrix Hamilton, une belle femme qui avait été actrice amateur. Stephen Leacock s'intéressait à la science économique et en 1903 il est devenu docteur de philosophie et économie politique et science politique "magna cum laude".

En 1901 Stephen Leacock a commencé une longue amitié avec l'Université de McGill où il a enseigné l'économie 35 ans. Il a écrit son premier livre, "Elements of Political Science", en 1906. Il avait besoin d'argent et heureusement pour lui, le livre était excellent et beau-

coup de collègues l'a choisi comme texte. En addition, à cette période, il a donné un discours à quelques groupes et a découvert qu'il était bon orateur, et il était très en demande.

Son premier livre humoristique "Literary Lapses" était publié après des difficultés en 1910 et était bien acclamé. D'autres étaient "Nonsense Novels", 1911 — parodies des "romans romantiques" et "Sunshine Sketches of a Little Town", 1912 — de la vie canadienne et des petits villages. Leacock a copié évidemment les gens d'Orillia, où il passait ses vacances d'été, et ils ne l'ont jamais pardonné. Dès lors il a écrit un livre humoristique presque chaque année — mais les premiers, à penser, sont les meilleurs.

La tragédie de la vie de Stephen Leacock lui est arrivé en 1925 quand sa femme est morte soudainement de cancer. On l'a découvert trop tard et rien ne pouvait la sauver. Ça lui faisait un grand malheur et l'a affecté le reste de sa vie. Un autre malheur c'est qu'en 1935 McGill l'a retiré, après une carrière heureuse, disant comme prétexte qu'il était trop vieux.

En 1941 il a écrit une histoire du Canada pour la Maison de Seagram. En 1944 il est mort de cancer, la même maladie qui avait pris sa femme, et le Canada avait perdu son auteur le plus fameux. Il est enterré à l'Ontario.

Tout compte fait, Stephen Leacock a écrit bien des articles et 61 livres, 35 humoristiques, et les autres, de différentes sortes, comprenant trois biographies — Mark Twain, Charles Dickens, et une autobiographie qu'il n'a pas fini, "The Boy I Left Behind Me".

Stephen Leacock avait beaucoup de talents. Il était pêcheur et navigateur. Il était excellent orateur et professeur; comme conférencier-humoristique, il avait fait le tour de l'Angleterre, des Etats-Unis, et de l'Océan du Canada. Ses livres non-fictions étaient excellents parce qu'il pouvait expliquer très clairement. Quant son humeur, elle était très douce, jamais cruelle, car sympathisait avec les gens ordinaires. Il connaissait divers gens, et tous ceux qui l'ont rencontré l'ont aimé.

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SCIENCE FAIR

Budding young scientists at Monklands had the opportunity to display their inventions at the second annual Science Fair held on March 2nd and 3rd. Parents and friends were invited along with many television and newspaper men and photographers, all interested in the numerous exhibits.

Exhibits came under such categories as breeding of baby mice (the first ever born at Monklands), the dissection of a rat, an amateur radio station, 'What is sine O', and many more.

Entries were judged on creative ability, scientific thought, thoroughness, clarity, dramatic value, and technical ability.

The first prize was taken by Sylvia Zaidman, Sylvia Allenby, Mike Steinmann, and Lynne Stockwell, all of Grade 10, for their exhibit on the projection of tropisms. A plant grown upside down was a feature of this display. Second prize was won by John Marsh and Ken Johns, both of Grade 11, for their exhibit on the use of electrolytic tests in aerodynamics. Third prize was awarded to John Williams and David Seaborn of Grade 11 for their exhibit on sedimentary rocks.

The special creativity award went to Robert Reid, Alan Pollack, and Ronni Kubelka of Grade 11 for their ray tracer.

The first prize was a three-year subscription to the 'Scientific American'. Second and third prizes were a one-year subscription to 'Science World'.

Judges were Dr. D. Jolly, Assistant Dean of Engineering at McGill, Dr. S. Madras, head of the Chemistry Department at Sir George Williams University, and Dr. J. W. Tomecko, manager of educational relations of Canadian Industries Ltd.

The Science Fair is hoped to be a regular feature of Monklands annually.

As a result of the excellent entries in this fair, Monklands was allowed to enter 12 exhibits in the Montreal Science Fair instead of the usual 2 allowed for other schools.





STUDENTS' COUNCIL

The Students' Council continued many of its regular activities and introduced several new events this year.

The first dance, the 'Welcome Hop', was held in October. This was followed by another social event, the 'Snow Ball', which honoured the football stars of the school. The 'Coronation Ball', which took place in early February, was Mcnklands' most successful and enjoyable dance. Carole Nobes and Richard Doyle were crowned Queen and King and Virginia Cuke and Ron Loch were crowned Princess and Prince. David King and his orchestra provided the music.

Two more dances, a novelty dance and the 'Spring Prom', completed the Students' Council social functions.

The study hall was also operated this year by the Students' Council in conjunction with the Prefect Board.

Unfortunately the annual 'Snow Sculpture Contest' had to be cancelled due to lack of snow.

CURLING

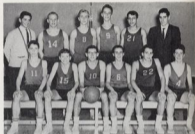
This year four teams were composed to represent Monklands in the Schoolboy Bouspiel. A good time was had by all and one of the teams went to the semi-finals.

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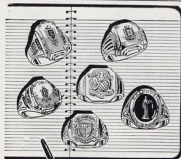
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
