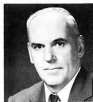
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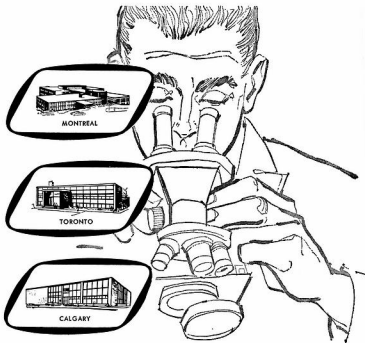

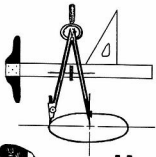

The same story set in modern times would be termed "a degrading tale of juvenile delinquency" by the very people that sigh over Shakespeare's version. Romeo and Juliet were two teenagers (Juliet was a mere fourteen years old) who met and were married without their parents' consent. During the course of the play, Romeo kills both the cousin of his bride, and the man she was supposed to marry. Added to these deaths, there is one more murder, one feigned suicide, and two successful suicides. There's nothing quite like young love, is there?

Other wholesome plays of Shakespeare are "Hamlet" in which are seen one knifing and four poisonings; "Othello" which contains two murders, one execution, one attempted murder, and one suicide; and "King Lear" which contents itself with six deaths.

If Shakespeare were alive and writing today, his works would most likely be relegated to the ranks of the lurid pocketbooks. Because of this, it is rather fortunate that matters stand as they do, for as banned reading material, his plays would probably reach and corrupt a much larger audience than they do now.

## LEOPARDS AND PANTHERS

"The panther is like a leopard

... says Ogden Nash, a well known writer of satirical and humorous poetry. Actually, have you ever wondered about the relationship between the two? Both belong to the cat family, Felidae, and both are large animals, fast runners and killers of much prey.

The leopard is usually most noted for his spots. These are black on a tan coat. His panther cousin, also known as the puma, mountain lion, or cougar, may be yellowish or tawny brown, but when the name panther is mentioned I generally picture an inky black creature, of which there are quite a few.

The panther and leopard range from about six to nine feet from nose to tail. The heaviest panther on record is 227 pounds while leopards are 100-160 pounds. The favourite prey of panthers are horses while their spotted friends prefer dogs. Their peppered coats are quite popular for fur pieces.

Les toiles de Riopelle sont dispendieuses et recherchées par les connaisseurs dans tout le Canada. L'un de ses tableaux, "Le Cirque", fait partie de la collection permanente du Musée des Beaux-Arts de Montréal.

Alfred Pellan, qu'on a qualifié de "Picasso canadien", compose des tableaux abstraits mais méticuleux dans leurs détails. Il manie ses couleurs de manière très fougueuse, et ses personnages révèlent souvent une disproportion surréaliste.

Cosgrove, dont une exposition eut lieu dernièrement aux Galeries Dominion, est un autre peintre célèbre. Son style est doux et libre — ses tableaux manquent du feu de Pellan et du coloris vigoureux de Riopelle mais, en revanche, il offre un goût impeccable et une subtile fusion de couleurs. Ses tableaux sont figuratifs, car il peint les portraits de femmes qu'il connaît, et il est enchanté par le paysage canadien.

Les peintres de langue anglaise ne peuvent que rarement rivaliser avec l'enthousiasme et la dévotion qu'affiche le peintre canadien-français pour son art. C'est probablement le dévouement de cette minorité isolée qui a produit les belles oeuvres artistiques qu'offre le Canada français au monde entier.

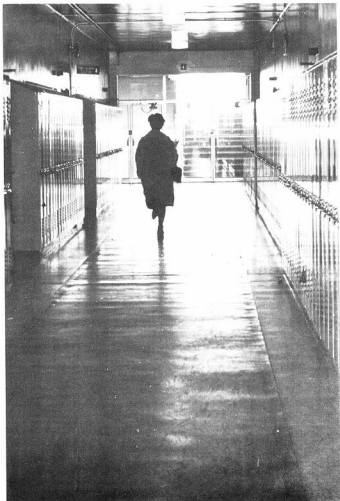

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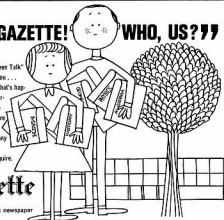

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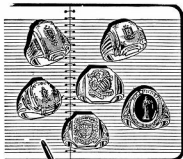
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
