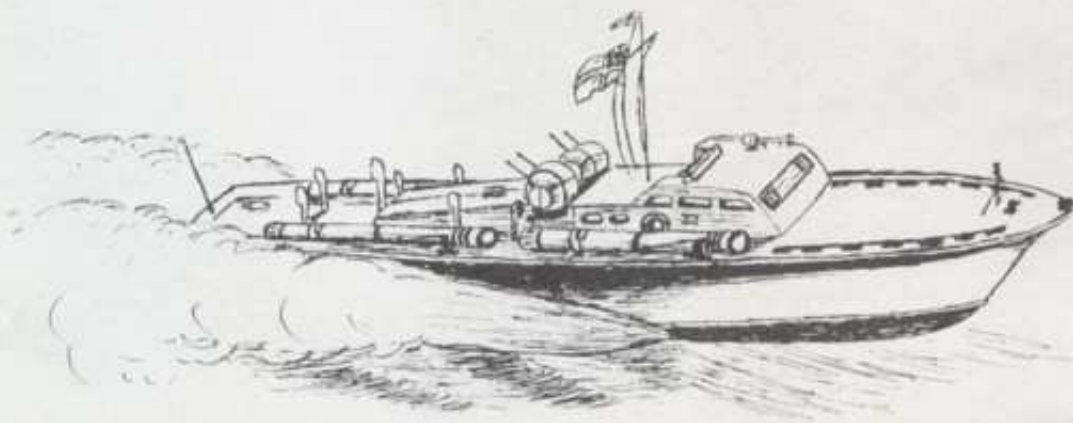
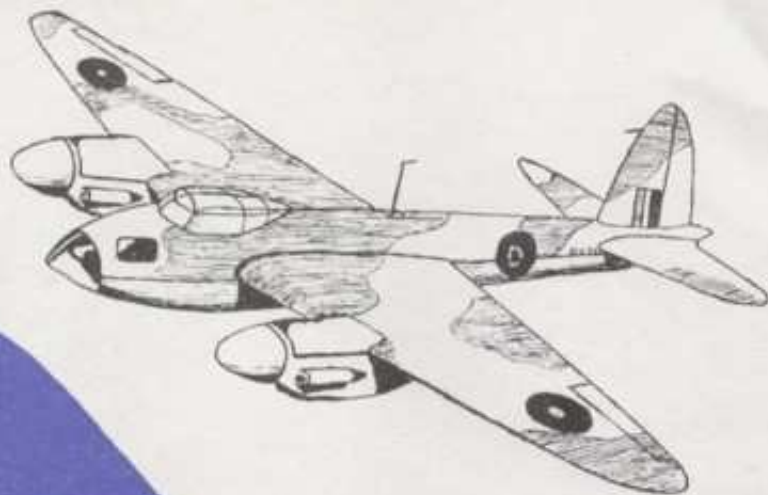
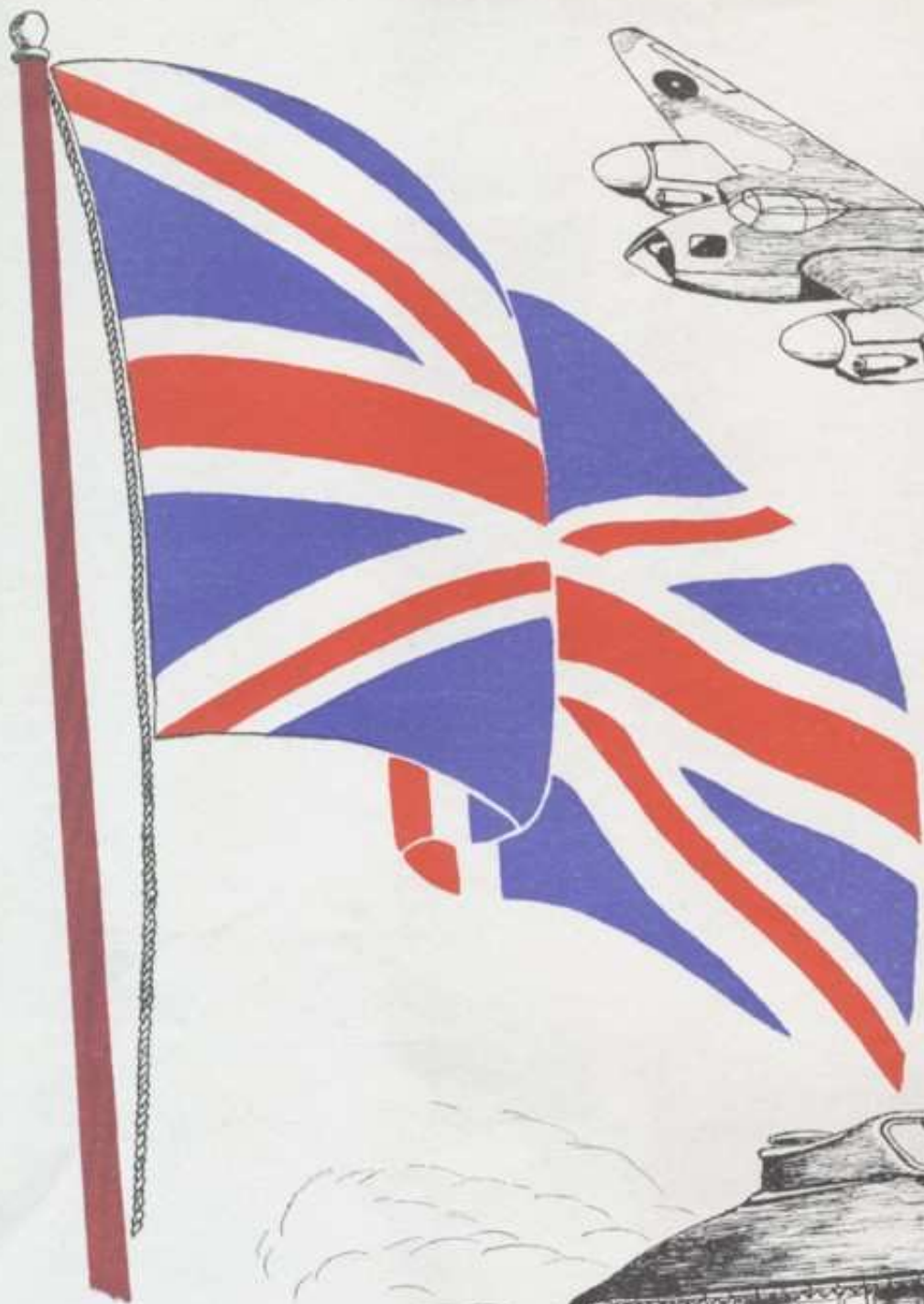

# CANADA

*through the eyes of*  
DEAN CORNELL

**H**IS is a credo, a confession of faith,  
a plea, an appreciation  
For Canada, the land that gave me  
birth in a little house  
On a quiet side street of one of her busy cities.  
This land took me and made me her own,  
She clothed and fed me with plenty.  
Her schools were open to me without prejudice  
—there,  
I might sit and learn what and as I would. A  
church  
Was mine wherein to worship as I pleased.  
Carefree, I romped her streets, piping in my  
shrill treble, I know not what,  
But no one ever said, "Be quiet, there may be  
listening ears  
That carry tales."

My parents and forebears for many generations  
back  
Have known these things. They made them by  
their toil and sacrifice,  
Felling the trees, then clearing stump infested  
fields whereon they raised their daily bread;  
Making each wilderness path a country lane;  
each cross-roads a city  
To echo with the hurrying feet of thousands.  
This land was theirs, they made it and they left  
it all for me  
To prize, to treasure, to hand on with great  
increase  
To those who come hereafter.

Canada means many things to me—her cities,  
The towering cliffs of steel and concrete; asphalt-  
paved streets,  
Sticky and pungent in the summer, snow-filled  
and rutted when the winter comes;  
The busy harbour, with the piles of bales and  
boxes destined for strange exotic places,  
The air filled with the dust of grain pouring into  
the holds of ships,  
But now the ports and harbours filled  
With long lines of tanks and guns and other  
things waiting  
To be carried to the conquering armies of  
freedom.

Canada means to me the Eastern Townships of  
Quebec,  
A white farmhouse resting in the green hand of  
spruce and pine and tamarac,  
The dusty road edged with the elms my great-  
grandfather planted there

Along which I pedalled in great glee my boyish  
bicycle.

The river where I spent the hot drowsy days of  
August building dams,  
Learning to swim, and catching punkin seeds  
and shiners  
With hook and worm.

The surrounding hills, the maples, soft and hard,  
red and yellow in the fall,  
Snow-clad in winter where I listened to the ring  
of the woodsman's axe,  
As I stooped in wonderment over rabbit tracks.  
Canada means to me the farm lands of Ontario  
Where they slope down to the Great Lake: a lake  
Which my great-great-grandfather crossed tak-  
ing, as he wrote in his diary,  
"Three days, when at last we made York, a  
thriving village protected by a spit of sandy  
land."

Canada is the tides of Fundy, the mightiness of  
the St. Lawrence,  
The stretch and reach of the prairies, the height  
and stolidness of the Rockies.  
Oh, she is fair and beautiful—crowned with the  
gold of the ripening wheat fields of the west,  
Eyes as clear and blue as the summer skies,  
flashing with the sparkle of a leaping moun-  
tain stream intent on reaching the Pacific:  
The flaming sumac of October is on her lips.  
She is one of strange names—Miramichi,  
Saguenay, Thunder Bay,  
Kenora and Rainy River, Medicine Hat and  
Moose Jaw, Esquimalt and Nanaimo.

Her sons and daughters have inherited much  
from Mother,  
Hers are the children of the good rich earth, a  
people  
Whose roots dig deeper than those of any oak,  
and harder to uproot.  
Hers are a people in whom the very breadth and  
depth of Canada  
Is part and fibre of their being. A people poised  
Whom no difficulties can move; a people, irre-  
sistible and with certainty,  
With the ruggedness of the Canadian Mountains  
and the frank generosity of the fertile plains  
and valleys,  
They are people of the wind and sun and rain.

It took rather a long time for your letter of 26th Nov., 1943 to reach me in the Mediterranean area, but it was nevertheless most welcome. Thanks for the gen on some of the old staff and their whereabouts.

You ask for a bit about myself, but I am afraid that now, at long last, that there is actually something to write about, the censor would not permit. My story is similar to a million others and starts out with Brockville, Petawawa, England (where we fought the battle of the London pubs) and finally the Mediterranean, where the local "Vino" replaces the "Molsons" or Mild and Bitters. Being amongst the unglamorous bunch that creep upon the earth (artillery) I cannot hope to compete with the news you will undoubtedly receive from our gallant West Hillians in blue.

If you look back over past "Annuals" you'll probably notice the little red number '38 was considered most radical at the time, but a good earthquake once in a while is a fine thing. Before I left England I wangled a good leave with my best friends: Frank Clarke (R.C.A.F.) Editor in chief '38, Ken Smith (R.C.N.V.R.) Sports Editor '38 and Tom Wilson (R.C.A.F.) myself assistant in the advertising field. We began our friendship with that Annual and have continued it these past few years, finally welding it in England. You have probably heard from them before you receive this.

As we all had a part in producing that astounding "document" we are fully aware of the problems which you face, and you have my personal sympathy. However, the Annuals seem to have been getting continually better, and I am sure your's will be no exception. Best of Luck!

In closing may I say how much I appreciate the fact of being remembered by W.H.H.S. It gives one a feeling of . . . well, you'll find out in a couple of years.

Your gift of cigarettes arrived to-day and I was delighted to receive them. Smokes from home are greatly appreciated over here and I realize that it must require a great deal of time and effort to compile a list of all the old members of West Hill High who are now in the forces.

I also received the School Annual some time ago and found it most interesting. I was shocked to see that we had lost so many of the boys.

I have seen a few of them since being over here. Mr. Lunan and George Wegg were both patients of mine in December, but have since been discharged and are now back on duty. We had a great time getting together and discussing mutual friends etc.

Perhaps you would be interested to know a little about the hospital and our work. We have twelve hundred beds. Six hundred medical and six hundred surgical which would of course be changed to meet any emergency. There are eighty Nursing Sisters—including a dietitian, three physiotherapists, Home Sister and Occupational Therapist. There are about thirty-six medical officers and over three hundred N.C.O.'s and men.

At present most of our patients are boys stationed near here who have had accidents or have taken ill, but at one time we received a fairly large number of casualties from Sicily. That was really the first time we had cared for actual war casualties.

They were, in everyone's opinion the most cheerful, happy crowd we had ever looked after and some of them had been wounded pretty badly. They were most appreciative of everything that was done for them. Perhaps it was because they were glad to be in a Canadian hospital and away from the Front Line, but somehow I think it was their youth and joy-of-living that made them such good patients. Even the night they were admitted, tired from their long journey, they were full of wise-cracks—all with big grins on their faces and anxious to know how their friends had stood the journey. It's pretty hard to beat boys like that.

The hospital is situated in rather an isolated spot so that most of our activities are within the unit. We have moving-pictures twice a week for patients and staff, Bingo games, occasional Concert parties. The Occupational Therapy department plays a large part in keeping the bed patients amused. They do all kinds of handicrafts—make belts, scarfs, toys—do fancy work, etc. Some of their work is really beautiful.

The Red Cross visits the hospital twice a week and supplies the boys with cigarettes, candy and reading material.

I hope I have not bored you with all these details and I hope you find some of it interesting. Sometime in the not too distant future we may be moving to another country and then things will change. I think that everyone is waiting for this time and to get the job over with and do it to the best of our ability.

Please remember me to the staff at West Hill and thank you again for your kindness.

This is your ex-West Hill soldier writing. Yesterday I received your letter of Nov. 25, '43 which was a welcome surprise, and I couldn't figure out who it could be. The envelope address looked like the handwriting of a girl you may know, Violet Cavey who lives on Wilson. I know her family pretty well and receive the odd letter from them. At first I thought it was her but I soon had to change my mind.

It's nice to hear from a West Hillian who is right on the spot. I graduated in '41 in Arts, one of Mr. Brash's Latin boys. Then to McGill for two years, one of Science and then to Engineering. I nearly went to 12th year, in fact I was set on it but changed my mind a few months before I returned. Then last June I joined up in the ranks and September found me in England.

Yes, I heard about Mr. Atkinson's resignation, and the new principal Mr. Heslam. I know something about Mr. Heslam as I took a few Physics lessons from him once. At that time I liked him a lot, although it never occurred to me he would soon be the new W.H.S. principal. You say he has brought in many new ideas, I can't imagine what they would be unless he has taken down the iron bars on the main steps, boys' side. I used to sit on those stairs every noon hour until they barred them off.

There must be a lot of new teachers in, I know there has been a big outflux to the services. The last teacher I saw before I left was Mr. Davidson, at the time he was Sub. Lt. Davidson who was off to London, Ontario. I think he must have been the school's most popular teacher, he certainly had plenty of friends on the boys' side, and he married the secretary in the end.

I heard of West Hill's latest rugby championship soon after they beat Catholic High—my parents

and friends sent me the clippings, and of course that would be news.

Last year I learnt quite a bit about the Students Council, I think it's the finest idea and if handled right it will do the school, both staff and students, the most possible good. However the last notice I had of the council was that certain teachers were imposing too much on it, that notice of course was from a student, but I hope it functions without trouble or any would be dictators.

How is the Annual this year? One of my best chums, John Summerskill was editor in '41, and as I sat behind him during its creation, I saw his many varied problems; however, to my mind he turned out the best Annual I have seen yet.

As to contributing to the Annual, my only personal contribution was the Junior Basketball team's write up one year in which we lost the city championship by two points. I doubt that I could write anything of use now although my composition marks were always rather high. However, I'll think hard for the next few weeks and maybe something will pop up, if so I'll pack it off to you in quick time to make the Annual's deadline.

By the way, is this a person-to-person letter or does the whole school (all 1200 of them) read this also? It's a little difficult knowing just what to say, I guess you know how it is.

Recently I spent my nine days furlough in England and Scotland. I had four days in Northern England at the home of relatives there. It was the town of Kendal near Lake Windermere. The lake district is very pretty, although December is a poor month for sight-seeing. Then three days in Edinburgh. Here I visited the famous castle which is set up on the hill in the centre of the city. It is a beautiful sight both to and from the castle, and it doesn't take much imagination to see how the castle was built on a hill top and how the surrounding town grew up around it. I was in the personal room of Mary, Queen of Scots, it being open to sightseers. It is bare except for a few old chairs and oil paintings and a bust of Mary. It's hard to imagine how a Queen would be comfortable in it. The windows overlook the east end of the city and you can picture her looking down at her peoples' daily life.

One of the rooms has an enormous fireplace, it is four feet high and about ten feet across. Now I see how they used to roast whole venison and animals at once. On the ramparts is an ancient artillery gun "Mons Meg", it seems to me I read about it in history. It is something to see especially for a gunner like myself. The barrel is big enough to climb into and have an afternoon sleep just like in class.

Well, that's about all I have to say right now, I hope I haven't been too dull. I shouldn't be though, because West Hill life isn't so far back, and there are fellows my age still there. I say the latter to convince myself I'm not ancient.

### No. 72 SQUADRON

Last summer some sixty cadets attended camp at the No. 3 F.I.S., Arnprior, Ontario. An enjoyable ten days stay was had by all under the leadership of Flt. Lt. Brasford, who was later transferred to another school. The Squadron was very sorry that Flt. Lt. Brasford had to leave and extends to him their best wishes for his success as C.O. of the William Dawson Squadron.

When School opened last September we were told that the new Physical Instructor was to be Mr. W. O. Searle who also was to be the C.O. of the Air Cadets. He immediately started getting the Squadron into shape after the summer vacation. He was given all possible assistance by the Squadron Officers. F.O. Miles continued his duties as Equipment Officer. He has held this important position for two years.

An N.C.O. Class was organized which was attended by about ninety cadets. This course was held once a week until Christmas time when it was discontinued and promotions and appointments

made. Valuable assistance was given all year by Drill Instructors of the R.C.A.F.

After Christmas the Squadron was formed into nine flights. These flights were divided into three squadrons and each squadron drilled once a week in the gymnasium. When the good weather came late in April, drill was held out of doors and consisted of route marches and practices for the Annual Inspection.

During the Sixth Victory Loan, a group of cadets took part in the Victory Rally at the Forum.

F.O. H. Jones took charge of both Brass and Bugle Bands. Many practices indoors during the winter months resulting in the Squadron having an excellent Band to lead its practices. Many members of the Bands are Cadets now attending the Eighth Grade at Herbert Symonds School.

Navigation, meteorology, airmanship, aircraft recognition, administration and Morse signalling were studied in regular class periods as was the practice last year. Each of the Air Cadet Officers of the Squadron is an Instructor in one or more of these subjects.

L.A.C. insignias were presented to each cadet who had been in the squadron for at least one year. A limited number of great-coats were issued during the winter months.

There are many cadets in school this year who are wearing the red flash in their caps indicating that they have joined the R.C.A.F. and will be called for active service when school is out.

Twenty years from now many of the leaders in the aircraft industry in this country will be able to look back to their school days when as an air cadet they were given their initial training which resulted in their life work. When the Air Cadet League of Canada was formed, it was organized with an eye to the future of aviation. New developments are taking place around us every day in this industry of the future. This Country will be able to look back to the organizers and officers of the League, in a few years, and thank them for a valuable contribution to an industry which will hold supreme importance in our national life.

#### JUNIOR RED CROSS

All the Girls' Classes and three Boys' Classes this year organized as Branches of the Junior Red Cross. In spite of the great need, the girls, as a whole, did not knit and sew as diligently as in former years; but many individuals have been good and faithful workers. Up to May, the total number of articles is about eight hundred.

Nine delegates attended the Junior Red Cross Conference in March, at which Shirley Tait, IX-C and Bob Wilson, X-B were speakers. The girl delegates reported the Conference to two Assemblies of girls in the Auditorium.

The eighteen branches have contributed about One Hundred and Ten Dollars to the funds of the Red Cross, including Administration Expenses, Prisoners of War and Aid for the children of various occupied countries. In addition, X-B gave Thirty-Five Dollars to purchase an outfit for a child in a War Nursery in Britain; the girls have almost completed an outfit for a girl in a War Nursery. Contributions for the latter have been received from X-A, IX-C, IX-G, Girls' Menorah Clubs and the Girls' Hi-Y.

## A STRANGER LOOKS AT WEST HILL

In the wilds of Canada, in a little town situated on the St. Lawrence River, lives an eerie cult of natives who all appear to be under the spell of their medicine-men. ## WHAT I CONSIDER THE MOST WONDERFUL MODERN INVENTION

For the past few years it has been the standard opinion of numerous writers that the rocket-bomb would be the most potent weapon imaginable in wars to come. The principle of the rocket-bomb and the bomb itself has a great future, not only as a deadly war weapon, but also as a peace time boon.

The rocket-bomb has been used by both Allied and Axis nations alike. Although British and American have been using them and although they no doubt have a few "tricks" up their sleeve, the Russians have had the most success with the rocket so far. The Germans, too, have made great progress in this field and Hitler's "secret weapon" could very easily be a type of rocket bomb or plane.

Before we can begin to discuss the various uses and possibilities of the rocket, it is necessary to see how they are composed and the principle on which they function. Rockets are of two types, the solid fuel type and the liquid fuel type. The bomb is propelled by hot gases ejected from a nozzle at the tail. These gases are formed in the liquid fuel type by the rapid combustion of a liquid fuel such as alcohol or gasoline in conjunction with liquid oxygen. The solid fuel type works on the same principle, the gases being formed by the combustion of a solid, usually a mixture of saltpetre, sulphur and charcoal.

The rocket was first used in the early days of the war as a "booster" on large bombers. The pilots of large German bombers found that they had difficulty in getting their planes into the air with a heavy bomb load. Consequently the bombers were fitted with racks of rockets which were placed underneath the wings. The rockets, when fired, gave the plane a sufficient boost to get it off the ground.

The rocket gun came into being next. As many as twelve rockets were fired from one gun. The shells consisted of an explosive head, the propelling charge and tail fins helped to keep the shell on a straight course. These shells have greater penetrating force, a flatter trajectory, and can be fired much more quickly and thus in greater numbers than the ordinary shell. Rocket guns have also been fitted to German fighter planes and with some success. However an extra fuel tank fitted to the Thunderbolt or Lightning enabled them to escort their bombers to the target and shoot down the slow-moving rocket carrying planes.

A more recent development, now being used by the British Merchant Navy, is the parachute bomb. Fired into the air by rockets the bomb trails several steel tapes. As it reaches the height of its flight, a parachute opens above it and it drifts down providing excellent defense against attacking aircraft.

The "bazooka", an American invention, also operates on the rocket principle, firing a deadly shell which is very effective against tanks and pill-boxes.

Then again bombs have been fitted with rockets and are propelled down from the attacking bomber in almost a straight line, thus greatly increasing the chances of a "hit" by the bomber.

Last, but certainly not the least, the rocket plane itself has been successfully used. Operating on the same principle as the rocket bomb, the rocket plane is destined to be the airplane of the future. It and its cousins, the rocket bomb, and rocket shell, are going to play a big part in the world of tomorrow.

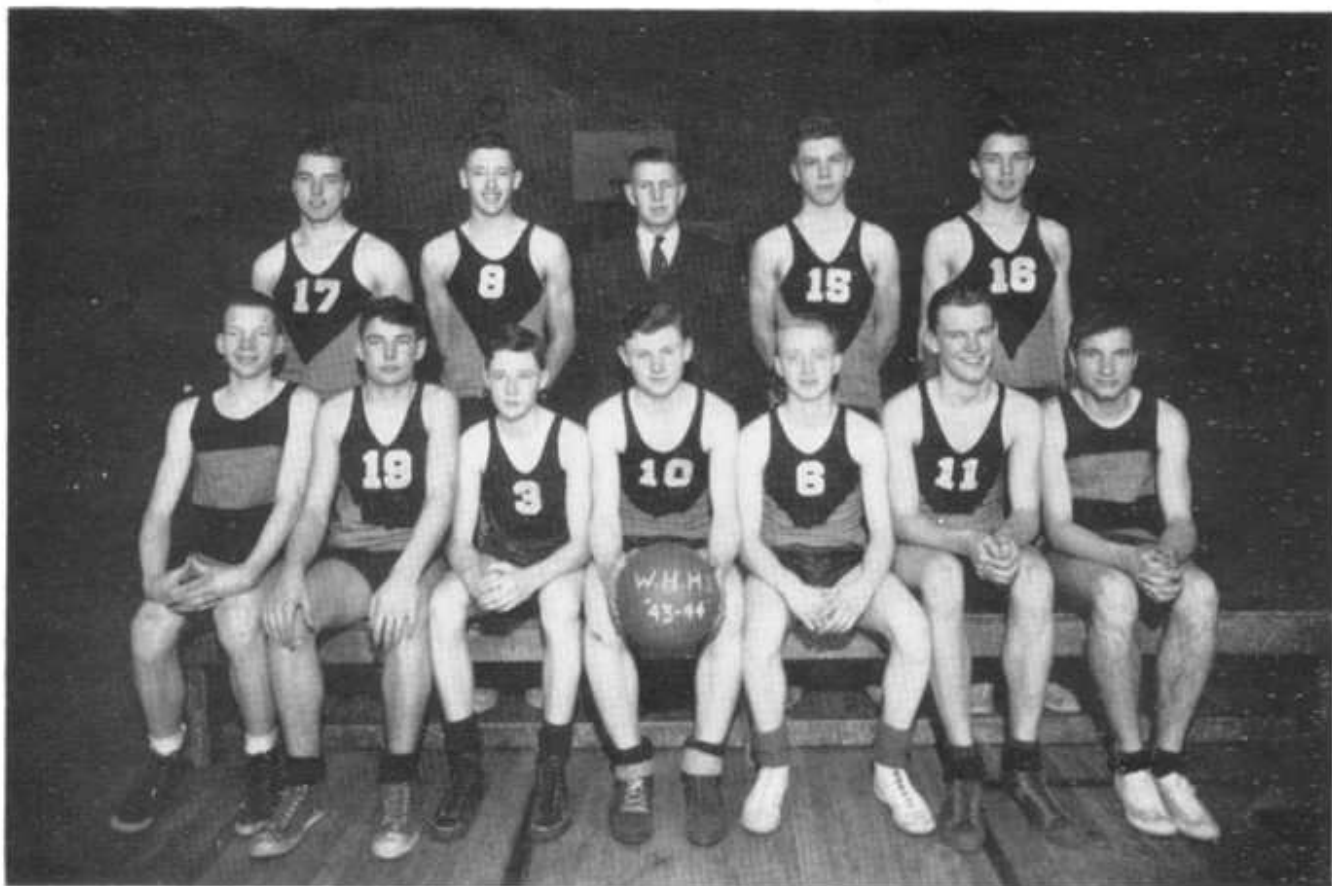
