## Principal's Message

Early in this school session the West Hill Home and School Association, the Old Boys' Association, and the Girl Graduates carried out a Campaign to raise money from among their members for a Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Under the chairmanship of Mr. Dudley Wilson the Campaign was organized and carried out in October and November, 1946. Great credit is due Mr. Wilson, the Campaign Committee, and all members of the organizations concerned for the success which attended their efforts. To date some twenty thousand dollars have been paid in or pledged. While this sum falls short of the objective of the Campaign by five thousand dollars, it is a creditable amount which can be augmented in the future and which will provide, in perpetuity, a fitting memorial to those West Hill students who gave their lives in the last war.

The money already collected is, shortly, to be put in the hands of the Trustees; they will be the Principal of West Hill, the Vice-Principal, the senior Lady Teacher, two members of the Home and School Association, two members of the Old Boys' Association, and one member from the Girl Graduates.

The Trustees will use only the income from the invested fund to provide scholarships for deserving students who wish to proceed to higher education.

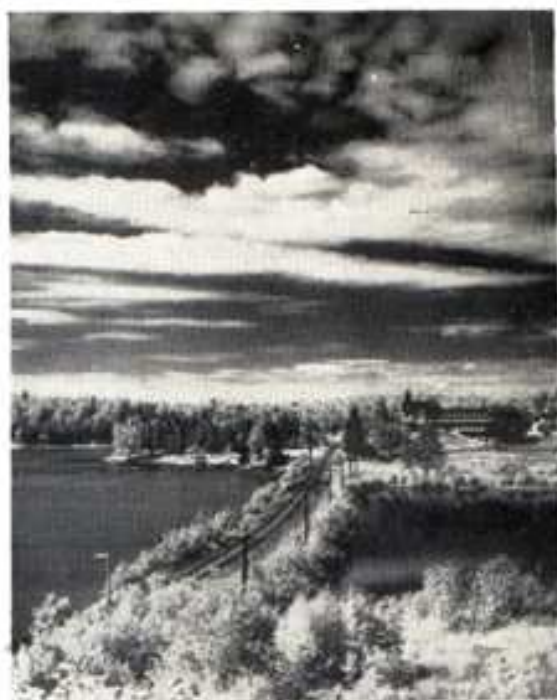

## THE U. N. O. AND THE HOPE FOR PEACE

When the last bullet had been fired and the weapons of war laid aside, the hope in the hearts of all men for peace and security is born anew. Now, after the most devastating war in all history, this hope is stronger than ever. But, there is also an increasing uneasiness arising from the dissention among the victor nations and internal unrest in many countries. The goal of lasting peace, if it is to be achieved, can be reached only by concerted action and not by wishful thinking.

This was shown after the first World War, when the crusaders of peace met to form the league of Nations. Though they tried hard to find a formula for a lasting peace, they failed. The reasons for their failure are many and varied.

The principal reason was perhaps the reluctance of some of the great powers such as Great Britain, France, and Russia to scrap the old system of power politics and secret alliances. The United States was equally at fault in failing to join the league, due to its reaction towards isolation from European affairs. This short-sighted policy was based on the mistaken belief that one nation could concern itself only with its own domestic affairs and still be unaffected by political trends and changing economics in other parts of the world.

While subscribing to the high ideals on which the League was founded, most nations were averse to becoming involved in controversies in which they were not directly concerned. This led to timidity in dealing with such aggressors as Italy and Japan; when Italy struck at the sovereignty of Ethiopia, and Japan began its expansion with the invasion of Manchuria.

This failure to stamp out aggression at the start may have been due in part to the lack of effective machinery to deal with international law breakers, but there was also lacking the desire for real cooperation. A direct result of this was the failure to reach a satisfactory peace settlement with Germany. The victorious nations were more concerned with punishment, than in determining and remedying the basic causes of war. At the same time, there were no effective and lasting steps taken to curb the war potential of Germany because of the rise of Bolshevism in Russia and the desire of the western powers to maintain a buffer between them and what they thought was a threat to their security from eastern Europe.

The resentment of the German people at what they considered unjust peace terms and the short-sightedness and mistrust on the part of the allied powers was the first step towards the second World War. The rise of nationalism in Germany, exploited by Hitler and his Nazi party and directed step by step towards conquest of neighbouring

countries, was met with indecision and inaction by nations that could not or would not cooperate for peace, and resulted finally in a second World War.

When the democratic nations were plunged into World War II, nationalism was relegated to secondary place. The meetings of the leaders of Great Britain, the United States, and Russia, led to an interchange of ideas and the formulation of a basis for cooperation that resulted not only in victory over Germany and Japan, but also laid the groundwork for an international organization for the settling of post war problems and the peaceful settlement of disputes between nations. This new international council of the allied nations is called the United Nations' Organization.

The framework of this world security organization was created at Dumbarton Oaks in October, 1944, at a meeting of the five principal allied powers, the United States, Great Britain, Russia, France, and China. Under the Dumbarton Oaks proposals the United Nations Organization has four "principal organs": (i) General Assembly, (ii) Security Council, (iii) International Court of Justice, (iv) Secretariat.

The General Assembly is an international forum. Every member of the Organization is automatically a member of the Assembly, and is free to discuss any questions relating to the maintenance of world peace and security.

The Security Council has eleven members. Five of them—the United States, Great Britain, Russia, France, and China—will have permanent seats. The other six are elected by the Assembly and are temporary, with a normal term of two years.

The International Court is an International Court of Justice.

The Secretariat is a permanent research and managerial staff, and is headed by a Secretary-General who has the right to bring to the attention of the Security Council any matters which, in his opinion, may threaten international peace and security.

On April 25, 1945, at San Francisco, the delegates of fifty nations, great and small, met to consider the Dumbarton Oaks proposals, where, after nine weeks of discussion and sometimes heated debate, the charter of the United Nations Organization was finally drafted and signed on June 26.

One might ask what this all adds up to. The United Nations is not a world organization in the full sense of the word because a good part of the world is left out. It is not a world government since its members retain their full sovereignty. The Organization is an earnest attempt to prevent another war. As long as the great powers act together, there can be little fear of war on a large scale. On the other hand, if the most powerful nations cannot agree upon a peaceful settlement of their differences, no combination of "peace-loving nations" is capable of preventing a major war.

Among the things that are essential in contributing towards the success of the Organization in its quest for world peace is free discussion. This might be considered the Assembly's most powerful weapon and is essential if there is to be a free and peaceful world.

The most important thing of all is faith. It has been said that faith moves mountains. In the old League of Nations many men in their bid for peace lost their courage and quit. Everybody knows the result. The men in the U.N.O. are representing hundreds of millions of people who are looking for peace and security. These crusaders must have faith in the ability to solve international problems by free discussion and perseverance, and must not lose sight of the ideals on which the Organization was founded.

The actions of the Russians have been of growing concern to the capitalistic countries of the world. When we say that we are working for peace in general, perhaps we really mean: can we build a firm peace with Russia? The leaders of the United States and Great Britain began working on that question in the very midst of the war. The question at that time was whether the Soviet Union would be willing to join a world organization for peaceful purposes. The U.S.S.R. often sees every man's hand against it, even when that hand is extended in sincere friendship. Of course, we have our own suspicions of Russia's world-wide extension of Communism, which is their basic ideological policy. These ideological differences do not necessitate war. At the time of the Crusades it was thought that Moslem countries and Christian countries could not inhabit the earth in peace. The same thoughts arose during the religious wars between the Protestants and Catholics. Those ideas were proven false. Therefore, why cannot countries of different political beliefs inhabit this world in peace?

Through the United Nations Assembly, conflicting viewpoints can be presented, and, in open discussion, the peoples of all countries will have the opportunity to better understand each other's problems. Contributing to a greater interest and understanding by the peoples of the world, there is now the medium of radio, moving pictures, and the press.

The biggest thorn in the U.N.O.'s side is the question of the veto power vested in the permanent members of the Security Council. This veto privilege was necessary in order to win the acceptance of the charter by Moscow, as well as the approval of the charter by the United States Senate. The United Nations Organization would have little or no chance for survival as an international guardian of the peace if Russia and the United States failed to join. While the veto has been a target of much criticism, particularly from the smaller nations, it must be reserved by the Security Council if the U.N. hopes to endure. Even a great power would hesitate to exercise its veto in the face of the com-

bined opposition of many nations and world opinion. In the General Assembly, no nation has the privilege of veto, and all members must seek settlement of disputes through negotiation, mediation, diplomacy, and other peaceful means, only resorting to the Council as a last means of settlement.

Today the whole world strives for a higher standard of living. Regions of the world that have long been burdened with destitution and poverty demand an opportunity for economic and industrial advancement, which would eventually lead to modernization, higher incomes, improved standards of health and education. To help these countries in their aims, there has been created an Economic and Social Council, consisting of eighteen representatives of different countries, elected by the Assembly for a term of three years. This agency is subject to the General Assembly and has been set up to carry out its recommendations with reference to the international economic, social, and other humanitarian problems, and promote respect for human rights. The Economic and Social Council can also make recommendations with respect to such matters on its own volition. This agency can do much in suggesting means of solving the social and economic ills that are the cause of much unrest in the world today.

The devastation and suffering caused by the last war are a constant reminder to the peoples of many nations of the horrors and futility of warfare. This is realized today as never before. If one were to foresee another armed conflict, he would picture the civilian population bearing the brunt of a warfare made more devastating and horrible through the use of atomic weapons, rockets, electrically controlled missiles, increased capacity and range of aircraft, and, most terrible of all, bacteriological warfare, which would ultimately result in the general destruction of civilization.

The nations of the world must realize that no one country can isolate itself and prosper, but that the welfare of each is dependent upon the well-being of all.

The United Nations has only begun its task for complete world concord. Given wholehearted support by the member nations and the full backing of public opinion, its strength will gain as time goes on. Every difficulty overcome, and every decision reached will give it added stature. With patience, determination, and faith, little by little the wall of mistrust between nations will be broken down until it is but a layer of dust, leaving the way open for world harmony.

As international accord increases, the industry and resources used in war can be applied towards improving the social and economic systems throughout the world. In this direction lies the future hope for a World Government.

The U.N. gives us far more effective machinery for honest collaboration than we have ever had before. It is for continued progress in its task that the peoples of the world are waiting and hoping.

## GUIDANCE — A BREAK FOR STUDENTS

To many of us the termination of our secondary education presents a confusing problem. Conditions following the war have greatly emphasized this problem. High intellectual standards required and attained during the war, coupled with the opening of many new fields of industry requiring intense training, have helped to over-tax and in many cases antiquate our educational systems. Added to this is the fact that education is undergoing another immense revival which is bringing many more young people under the scope of secondary education.

The effect on the universities and technical schools is obvious; they have been forced to raise their requirements. This, contrary to popular belief, has not produced a smaller and select group of graduates, but a larger and generally improved group. It does, however, mean a greater effort on the part of the high school students.

Also, the more time-consuming social and sports activities of this generation have placed a greater strain on the students' time, and still limited ability.

A person who tries to combine the activities of two or three teams in addition to four or five social activities and three hours of homework every night has a tough assignment. All three are necessary to build a well-rounded personality, but some things should be given a priority on your time. The person who does not have at least a fair education has to come up the hardest way. He is under a great handicap and is very vulnerable to narrowmindedness (mainly due to his ignorance). He has a good chance of becoming pessimistic, cynical, or both. The person who does not mix with others, thereby failing to develop a sense of responsibility to others, or with little tact, or interesting conversation, is under a different and almost as great a handicap. Lastly, the one who does not take part in sports sometimes does not develop self-confidence and physical health in general.

Each individual requires a slightly different combination of these three general activities. When trying to determine the right combination for oneself, three things should be considered:

- (1) your natural abilities or aptitudes;
- (2) your interests;
- (3) your present opportunities and resources.

The final decisions should be made from a pool of the opinions of yourself, your guardians, and a guidance counsellor. He is trained in present day conditions of education, and the opportunities, drawbacks, and operation of the industrial and professional worlds.

Guidance is not a new idea, but has been administered haphazardly by teachers ever since

schools were founded. The first attempts in the Province of Quebec, however, to organize guidance into a definite and systematic plan are only now being made.

Guidance has been defined as the process of assisting each individual to understand his abilities and interests, to relate them to life goals, and to progress toward these goals in the most economic and efficient manner.

The functions of guidance are many and varied. Some of the most important are the following:

- (1) To analyse each student's interests and aptitudes as far as possible.
- (2) To aid students in analyzing the opportunities in, and requirements for, certain educational, occupational, and social goals.
- (3) To encourage students to make tentative educational and vocational plans, to have a goal, and work toward it.
- (4) To aid in the placement of those who leave school.
- (5) To eventually follow up each student and further aid his adjustment.

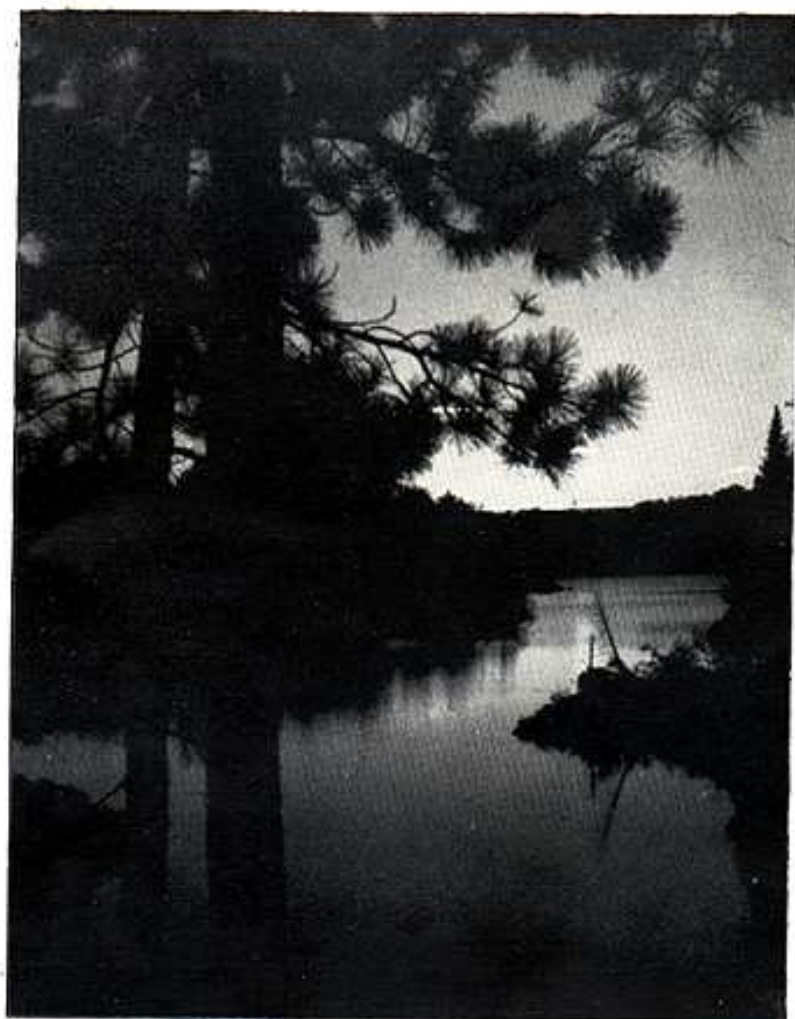
At West Hill, one period per week in Ninth Year, is devoted to practical discussions covering each aspect of guidance. Three subjects, The Relationship of School Subjects to Vocations, Profitable Use of Leisure Time, and How to Study, will be of particular interest to the students. The importance of personality, character, good habits, and ability to get along with others, is also covered. The overall picture of the Canadian vocational world is also included in order to broaden the student's viewpoint. The realism of the course is typified by the coverage of methods of investigating a career, and, ways and means of locating a job opening and advancement in the job.

The Career Conference held at West Hill this year was also a part of the programme. It was, excepting a few drawbacks which will undoubtedly be corrected by next year, a complete success. It succeeded in familiarizing the students with the guidance programme, and provided an encouraging base for future development. If conferences of this type could be held semi-annually, certainly most students would take advantage of the opportunity to cover more than two vocations.


A library service is gradually accumulating books and pamphlets on educational and vocational opportunities. These are available on loan, to any student in the school, at the guidance office, Room Five.

Intelligence and aptitude tests are now available to any student. These tests have a varied degree of accuracy, although the intelligence tests in particular are very accurate. Both, however, are very valuable and useful in aiding you to form a decision.

With all these facilities at their fingertips, it is sincerely hoped by Mr. Goodwin and his staff that all students will use them to their greatest advantage.

## THE VALUE OF CAREER CONFERENCES FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The Career Conferences are, by themselves, a vital aspect in any Vocational Guidance programme. They summarize all the aims of the vocational section of guidance.

Before the year 1930, seventy-five percent of North America's population farmed. Now a matter of only fifteen or twenty years later, seventy-five percent of the employed population are working in industry.

There is only one way to farm, but there are thousands of completely different vocations in the industrial world.

It would be very difficult for any average High School student to make reasonable choice without first consulting those who have had more experience and have a broader view of the situation. That does not mean that it would be impossible to make a choice in which he or she would be passably content. But, if they were given the opportunity to attend lectures on vocations which they had never seriously thought of before, they would probably find something in which they would be much more satisfied.

The conference held in February of this year covered thirty-six varied vocations. All those subjects were selected after a survey among the students to determine the most popular.

A majority of the students however, were disappointed by the fact that they could only attend two lectures. More than one conference a year is a definite need.

Another common disappointment was that each of the speakers spoke chiefly in relation to their own companies and did not cover the field completely.

In general, the conference accomplished two very important things. It convinced many students of the great importance of education in the business, industrial, and professional worlds. Secondly, it opened the eyes of many who had never thought of anything else since they heard that the doctor next door was making fifteen thousand dollars a year.

Better co-operation between curricular and athletic groups would be an asset. Narrow-mindedness on the part of certain powers has caused a rift between these two groups. We want our students to benefit from both curricular and extra-curricular activities, not from one or the other, as has too often been the case.

Financial backing is probably our greatest weakness. There must be some way of raising the necessary funds. Dances and other socials organized by both parent and student groups have proved successful in the past. Such programmes could be profitable in the future. Surely we could run our athletic programme on a more commercial basis without inviting criticism or endangering the amateur standing of our teams.

Success in this field depends on the enthusiasm and determination of students, parents and teachers. Let's create a spirit around the school that will make possible some of these or other reforms. We want West Hill to have the best. Let's do our best to bring this about.

## TALES OF INDIA

The curse of India is the Hindoo religion. More than two hundred million people believe a motley mixture of mythology that is strangling the nation. "He who yearns for God in India soon loses his head as well as his heart."

Modern Hindoo theology is a development of several ancient and odd forms of worship, the first form of which was called Vedism—the worship of nature. Some people, representing these sects of the middle ages, still survive and we see them about the streets of Calcutta, particularly at the Kali-Ghat Temple: Nail-men, whose nails grow until they pierce their palms; Sky-facers, who hold their faces rigidly upward till unable to bend them back; Up-arm men, who hold up their arms in the same way until they wither away; Tree-men, who hang upside down in trees like monkeys; Skull-men and Pot-men, who carry these symbols, and other forms of religious fanatics.

Most of the wretches that we see around the holy places of worship have no idea what their attitudes and symbols mean; all are intellectually degraded and some are mere fakers.

The modern Hindoo has one God who pervades everything, called Brahma. His three personal manifestations are as Brahma, the Creator; Vishnu, the Preserver; and Siva, the Destroyer. Brahma is generally represented with four heads and four arms in which he holds various symbolical objects. From Brahma, Vishnu, and Siva have sprung a multitude of lesser gods, whom the Hindoos, faithful to their practice of exaggeration, reckon up to the astounding total of 330,000,000.

The Hindoos believe that all evil proceeds from antecedent evil and that the penalty must be suffered in each succeeding existence. There are eighty-four lakhs (8,400,000) of different species of animals through which the soul of man is liable to pass, and the Hindoo's object is to rid himself of this series of continuous transmigrations so that he may live in the same heaven with his God.

To this end he makes offerings to the image of a god, abstains from killing any animal, gives money to priests, does penance which at times extends to severe bodily torture, propitiates demons, and keeps strictly the rules of the caste. And there are almost a hundred different castes, each entirely separate with regard to marriage and trades.

This, briefly, is Hindooism.

Sounds almost unbelievable, doesn't it? Yet more than twice as many people as there are in all the United States believe such things with a burning fervor that we, as Christians, cannot understand.

A strange country is India.

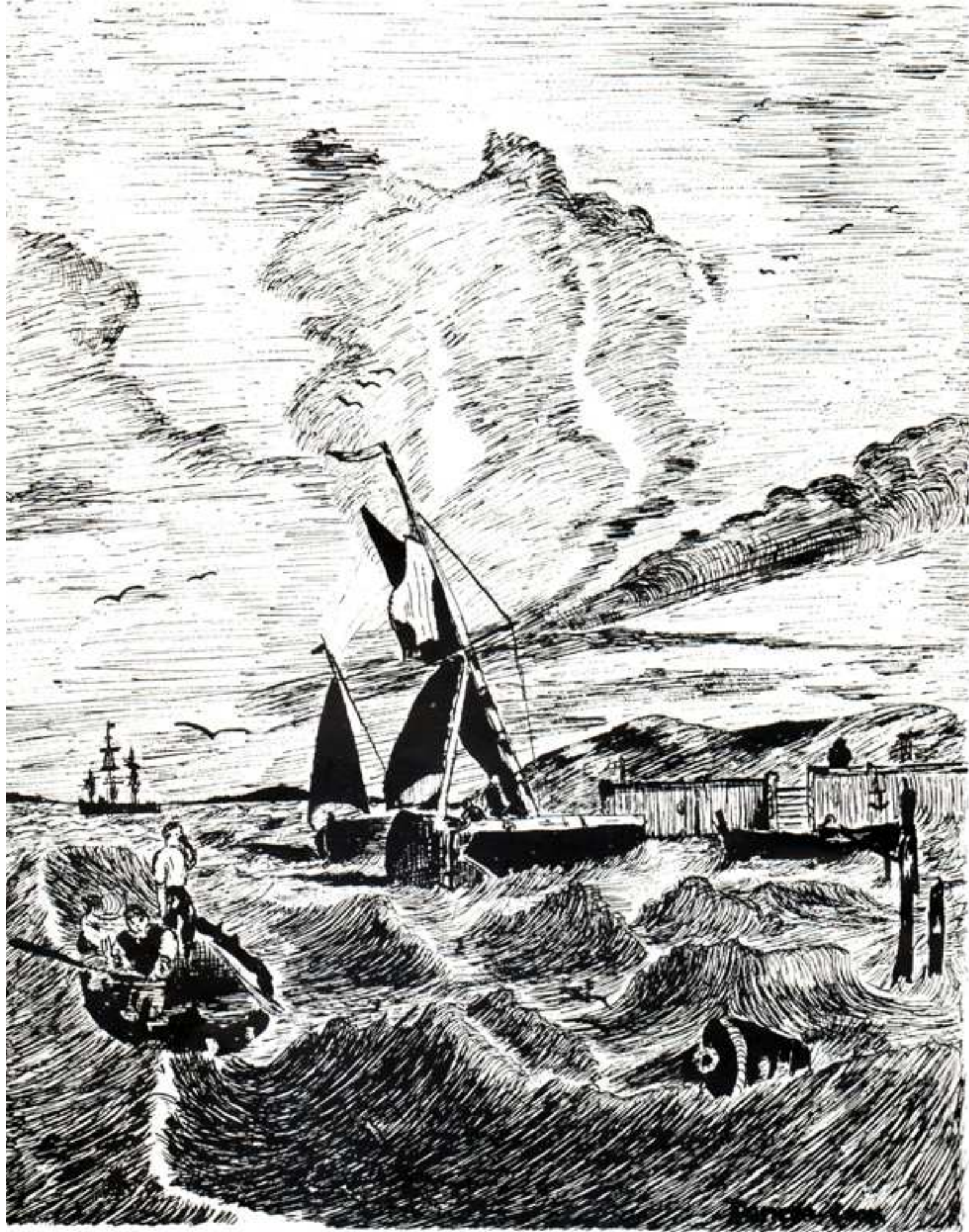

## GUNS THAT FIRE FIVE SHOTS A SECOND

"Tac-tac-tac-tac." This sharp rattling bark is the most fearful sound of war, far more fearful than the "Wham" of exploding shells. It is the voice of the machine gun, the deadliest killer of all, because it can cover a field with bullets at the rate of five per second. Attackers have no choice but to take immediate cover, and try to stalk the crew of the gun. This deadly fire was one of the major factors which transformed warfare during the War of 1914-18.

Ever since firearms were invented man has sought guns that would shoot faster than the single shot weapons which had to be reloaded after every shot. Success was partly achieved when Dr. R. J. Gatling invented the Gatling gun in 1861, which was followed by the French "Mitrailleuse". Both had a number of barrels that fired in turn as they were revolved around an axle by a crank.

Sir Hiram Maxim was the first man to invent a completely automatic weapon that loaded and reloaded and fired by itself. It was invented in 1881. It was improved by Vicker's-Maxim, and was used in the same war, 1914-18.

The Lewis gun, invented by Col. Isaac Lewis of the United States Army, was used in France, Britain and the United States, in the first war. In 1918 the United States army adopted both light and heavy machine guns, invented by John M. Browning. The light Browning machine rifle can be fired from the shoulder. It weighs 15 pounds and fires a clip of 20 bullets in 3 seconds with one pressure of the trigger. The heavy Browning gun weighs 37 lbs, and fires a belt of 250 bullets. It is water cooled and can maintain a fire of 20,000 shots per hour.

In 1935 Britain adopted the Bren machine rifle. There are two different kinds of machine guns: One is fired from the hip and is called a sub-machine gun or "Tommy gun". The other is mounted.

Guns were also adopted by the Air forces. They are fixed to fire through the propeller and also in the wings of light planes.

## HOW TO BE A SUCCESSFUL DEBATER

The successful debater must have one important ability, that of being roped into debates by his English Teacher. Another essential thing in English debating is a knowledge of how to read, write, and speak English. An audible voice also helps.

Your ego gets inflated more and more as the day progresses until it is time to leave. After a brief tussle with the teacher as to whether the debate is more important than his period, you are set free—free that is to head for the scene of your debate, usually some far-off school.

Upon arrival, you are sent through miles of corridors, and finally end up in a miserable dingy room, customarily called the SPEECH ARTS ROOM. Here you have a brief rest, while you wait for the judges, who arrive a half-hour late, and your opponents, who seem to be human after all.

Two or three people usually drift in and make up your audience, which is not very reassuring. However, at this stage of the game, all you can do is make the best of things. One by one, your fellow-debaters stand up and deliver their orations, and then you get up and give your speil.

Then the judges come out and award you the debate! Simple, isn't it? So, if you want to take up debating, remember the DEBATER'S MOTTO—

"Hic! Hoc! Hejee, bejee, squeejie!" which, in English, means—

If it's said — it's speakable,

If it's written, it's speakable,

If it's unspeakable, it's definitely speakable!"

## CANADA AND CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Four weeks ago, when I arrived in Canada, I started immediately to compare all things here with the things and conditions in Czechoslovakia. Some of them I considered to be better than at home, some, seen from my point of view, worse.

The first thing which surprised me very unpleasantly was the weather. Canada accepted me with a nice, not small snowstorm. Just coming from London, where the trees were flourishing already, I could not believe that it was possible to have snow on the fifteenth of April. In Czechoslovakia we had as much snow as on that day, only around Christmas time. Our climate is much milder, even the heat does not make the people as tired as here.

The second thing, which, for a change, made a good impression on me, was the nicely built family houses with gardens and trees. In Prague people are almost all living in big apartment houses without gardens, surrounded by dust and soot of the closely situated factories.

Used to having ration cards for everything, I did not know whether it was a dream or reality that people could get as much fruit and food of all kinds as they liked and were able to pay for; that nobody had to be hungry, because there were enough opportunities of earning at least as much money as is necessary for a modest life.

Another thing I like here is the freedom of dealing, speech and opinion, which everybody has here. Of course, Czechoslovakia is supposed to be a free democratic country too, and everybody is allowed to say what he wants. But, in fact, if you don't want to be regarded as disloyal, you had better not complain about anything concerning the government and its four political parties.

I miss here the concerts and stage plays we had at home. Czechoslovakia is a very musical country and it gave to the world many excellent composers, as Smetane, Dvorak and Frinl, whose "Rosemary" became a popular song even on this continent. Classical music and plays are a part of every Czech's life. Of course the cinemas here are good, but they can't replace either concerts or plays.

One thing I like here really very much is the schools. In Czechoslovakia there were six school days a week; teaching started at eight o'clock and lasted until two p.m. without a luncheon. In the afternoon every student had to study very hard for three hours. The professors explained everything only once; it was the pupil's affair whether he understood it or not. The relation between the teacher and the pupil is very strict there, while here the teacher seems to be an older friend of the student.

When I came first to the main part of Montreal I was amazed at the crowded streets, with the people chasing and pushing each other along. Later on my aunt explained to me that this crowd of women, men, children and cars is called "Traffic".

A little later, when I became acquainted with some of the Montreal citizens, I noticed another interesting thing. People in Canada are not as much interested in politics as they are in Czechoslovakia, where everybody is speaking about the danger of Communism, even if they don't understand it at all. People could not exist without some worries. If they don't need to be afraid of political changes they worry about the weather. And so the most important topic for conversation here seems to be climatology.

I have been here only for four weeks, which is a very short time to know anything about Canada, but altogether I think, when I have overcome the strangeness of everything that surrounds me, I will be as happy here as I was in Czechoslovakia.

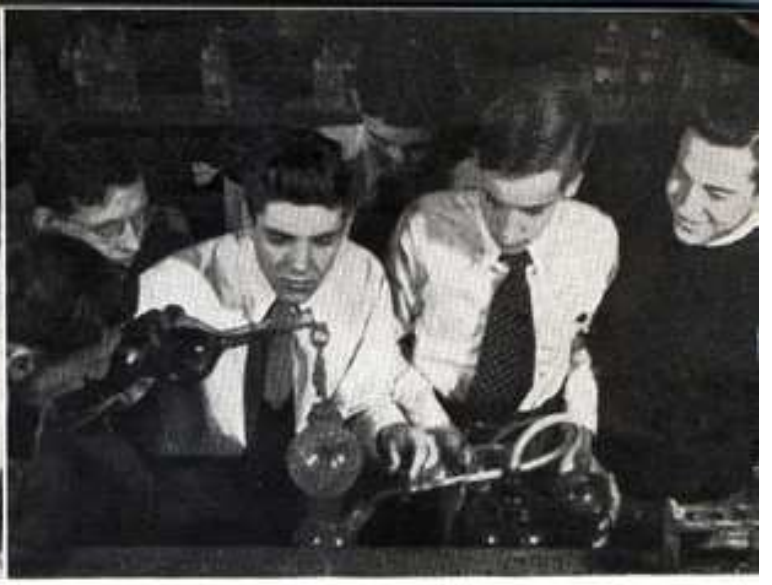
