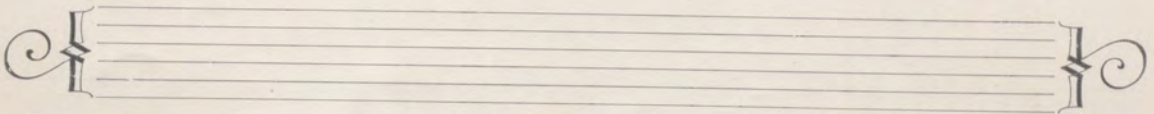
## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

There were girls and boys from every state in the eastern area, and there were two Canadians at this camp. Luckily, both of us were from Montreal. My Canadian companion at Bynden Wood was George Wilkie from Westmount High.

Bynden Wood was really a large hotel in the Blue Mountains of Pennsylvania. The girls occupied the hotel, while the boys slept in tents in the woods. 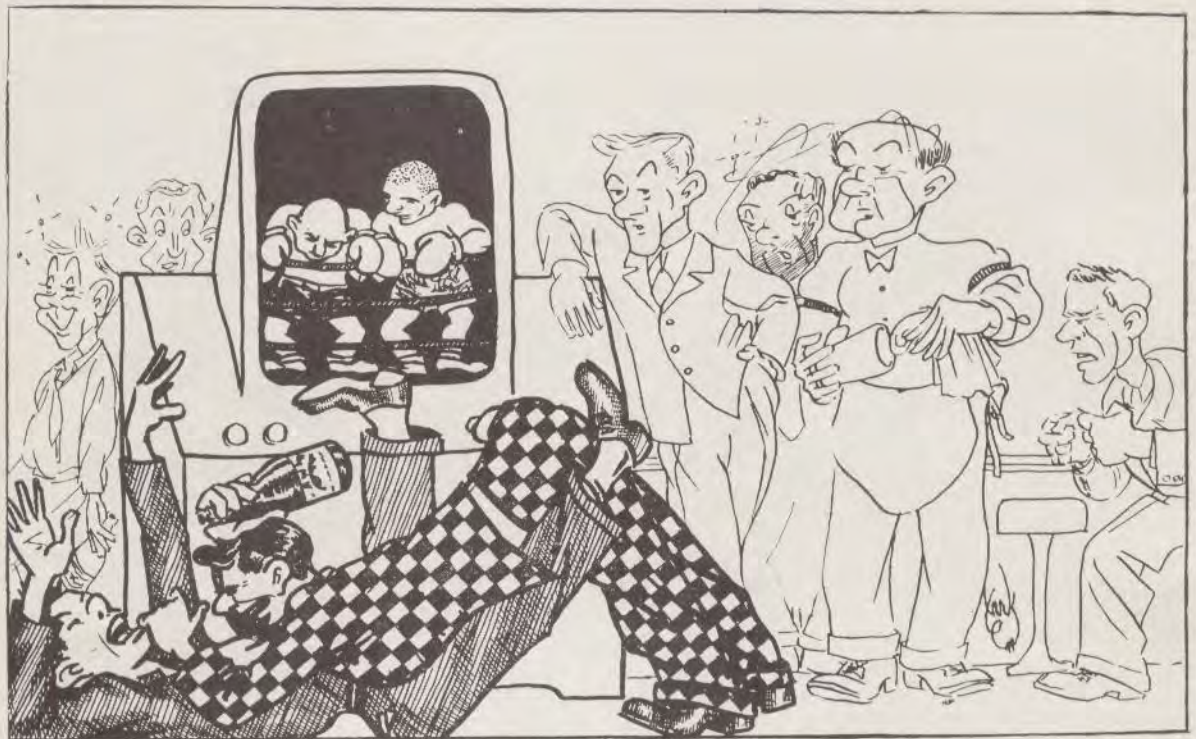

### A REPORT ON TELEVISION

A cycle has been completed. Twenty-five years ago, radio made its debut into the living rooms of hundreds of Canadian homes. Most of our parents were then experiencing the same stages of life through which we are now proceeding. A quarter-century later, we are witnessing television running the gamut from infancy to maturity, as yet not here in Canada, but in the United States and Great Britain. If this should be a sign of some sort, then we may predict that subsequently the world or, more locally, Canada, is on the verge of passing through an era of lively doings and prosperity. Even though such talk suggests mere fiddle-faddle, it is possible that the innovation of these two new media of communication—namely, radio and television—are actually small arcs in a large cycle, which is in the process of being completed. It is possible that we shall take part in yet another World War; it may follow that an entirely new medium of communication will arise out of it. Such a contrivance might be the answer to all our social and economic problems, in bringing about a better understanding between the peoples of the world.

Though the basic rudiments of video as television is being called by the trade were known to the scientists of Great Britain and the U.S.A. as far back as 1936 and 1937, they were not practically developed until immediately following VJ Day. In 1945 and 1946, the researchers and scientists of those two countries returned to invention with

re-charged vigour and new tools. Both their vigour and their tools were products of the war. It was not, however, until lately that TV jumped was the limelight. Seemingly over night, everybody into talking about the new means of communication. In the U.S.A., where everything is either done sensationally or not at all, magazines with giant circulations suddenly emerged with the story of television. "Time" and "Life" instantaneously became the greatest proponents of the sensation. Then came the Republican and Democratic conventions at Philadelphia last summer. There the politicians literally catered to the demands of the telecasters. A new problem had arisen for TV technicians. Until it could be mechanically solved, those televised were compelled to smear some ill-smelling facial preparation over their faces.

Not all those who were telecast in the first few years of video's post-war existence were as cooperative as the American politicians and their wives, at Philadelphia. Athletes in general had a difficult time in dealing with television. Spokesmen for the major Spectator Sports in New York last fall insisted that telecasts of sports were harming box office receipts. Newspapers, largely sympathizing with the telecasters, denied this; but nevertheless most baseball stadia over the U.S.A. have discontinued negotiations with TV stations.

Television in London is a nationalized industry. There is but one station. It is operated by the

B.B.C. and serves only the southern portion of the island. Later this year a second one will be put into operation for the Midlands. As of last fall, there were approximately 100,000 sets in England, compared to the more than one million in the U.S.A. In an interview with the New York Star, Norman Collins, controller of B.B.C. television, imparted the following information concerning the TV in England:

There is no television in the English pub.

The English equivalent of Howdy Doodie, N.B.C.'s popular puppet, is Muffin the Mule, also a puppet.

Some of the finer shows in the West End have been telecast. These include "Pygmalion", starring Margaret Lockwood; "King Lear"; the opera "La Boheme"; and six leading European ballet companies. The Parisian Lido Cabaret was also telecast. (The feminine performers of this group, unaccustomed to sheltering the upper parts of their persons with clothes, were induced to "cover up." Asked why this action had been taken, an authority explained, with typical drawl, "Well, after all, we're the B.B.C.!!!")

The one British television station, situated in London, provides from 28 to 30 hours of entertainment weekly. (Some American stations operate 90 hours weekly.)

According to a survey conducted for the B.B.C., women announcers are preferred, 3 to 1.

American video is louder and gaudier than British TV. The Americans, however, are doing more pioneering. They are improving both television sets and cameras at so fast a rate and with so much competition, that frequently one manufacturing firm introduces a new alteration which another firm has already put into production.

In the field of entertainment, members of show business are looking into the stock of gags, sketches, and acts used in the bygone days of vaudeville. Comedian Milton Berle was an early entry, with his Texaco Star Theatre, a popular revival of the vaudeville revue. Acting as Master of Ceremonies, he is requested to do everything but sell Texaco gasoline, and not long ago many viewers were amazed at his ability as a hooper. But Berle is just one of many veteran troupers who are interested in television. When Joe E. Brown, Fred Allen, Eddie Cantor, and Bobby Clarke—to name a few—will be seen, we shall have something really worthwhile.

In the United States, there are some sixty stations situated all over the country. At the beginning of this year, a coaxial cable was installed between New York and Chicago, so that people in the mid-west may now see programs emanating from New York, and vice versa. By January, 1950, it is expected that there will be two million television sets installed in American homes.

According to Vince Lunny in an article written for the Magazine Section of "The Standard", here are the facts about Canadian television:

Television will not be ready for Canada until 1950.

To duplicate the present C.B.C. radio networks with TV outlets would cost approximately \$200,000,000.

Six applications for television stations have already been presented to the Board of Directors of the C.B.C. Two applications are for outlets in Montreal; the other four are for stations in the Toronto area, which already has a certain number of sets, since Buffalo is within receiving distance.

It will cost about \$500,000 to set up a television station in Canada, and it would be three years at least before any profits would be forthcoming.

All applicants plan to use their broadcasting studios for television purposes, thus dismissing housing problems.

Several plans for TV in Canada have been submitted to the C.B.C. directors and are being considered. From the intensity of enthusiasm in the new medium by radio people in Montreal and in Toronto, we in Canada should indeed be having television by 1950.

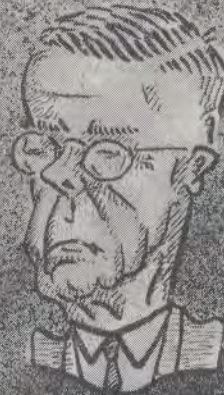
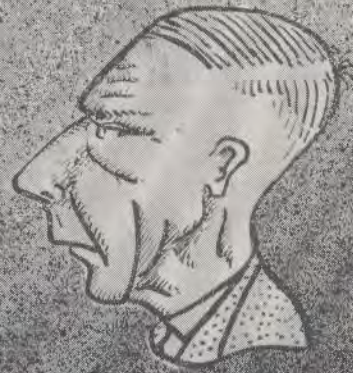
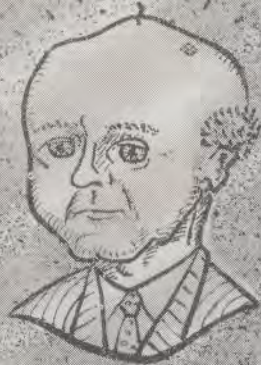

## A DEBATE

When young children start school, they think it is an interesting game. Does not a prize keep their attention on the game? They do not understand that they are learning to read and write for their use later on, but they will work harder, and respond to a reward, however small.

In some high schools, a system of badges for the girls has been instituted. There are usually two, one for a high standing, and one for an average standing in each subject. A girl wearing one of these shows the whole school that she has obtained the standard required, and these badges spur other girls on to work harder.

Badges for gymnastics are responsible for making more girls play sports and take an interest in them. Besides, the exercise is good for their fitness and health.

Scholarships are a definite necessity in every high school. Some boy or girl of outstanding ability who has not enough funds can be given the chance a scholarship provides. These students work hard, and the money spent on them is not wasted.

The negative, of course, states that rewards definitely do not belong in school. Small children, who lose out to someone who has not worked nearly as hard, just because they could not comprehend the work as easily, feel cheated. They feel they have worked for nothing, and are disappointed. Inferior feelings often result.

In high school, the pupils would not necessarily work harder for a piece of felt. These students are old enough to realize that they benefit by hard work and the knowledge they gain, and that high marks are reward enough. Some students, being more intelligent than others, would receive most of the rewards, and bad feelings on the part of others.

Rewards are a waste of money. It may be a small or large amount, but it should be put in a fund, and saved until it can be used for something from which the whole school will benefit.

In summing up for the affirmative, we find the following points:—

1. Pupils work harder if rewarded for their efforts.
2. Small children respond to rewards.
3. Badges are a good system in high school.
4. Scholarships are a necessity.

The negative has these points:—

1. Lazy pupils don't improve anyway.
2. High school students should work for their own benefit, not for badges.
3. Small children are too easily disappointed
4. Rewards are a waste of money.

I am leaving the decision of this debate to you, the reader. What is your judgment?

unknown man, from Gary, Ind., related in very brief form that his seven year old son was dying, and that his physician had said that the only thing that might save him was the possible knowledge that his idol, Babe Ruth, had sent him an autographed ball. The Babe was touched very deeply by this story and asked the man for his address, saying that the ball was on its way.

Realizing that he must be back in time for the third game of the World Series the next afternoon, Ruth boarded the next train to Gary—a very short run—and arrived there about 8:30 that evening.

With a brand new bat, glove, and personally autographed ball, he was led up to Jonnie's bedroom by the startled father, who had never dreamed that Babe Ruth would come himself. As he entered the room, the mother, doctor, and several close relatives of the child looked up in amazement, but did not say a word as the child lay there, eyes shut, his life slowly ebbing away.

The Babe solemnly walked over to the boy's bed, and seating himself beside him, he talked to the child in the same manner in which he had spoken to many others, who also had considered him their idol. Speaking reassuringly to Jonnie, he tried to make him realize who was talking to him. When he saw that the boy remained motionless, eyes still shut, he placed the ball in his hand, and then only did little Jonnie open his eyes, but merely for a few seconds. The boy looked up, smiling, and nodded. Ruth then got up from the child's bed, and leaving the bat, ball, and glove there, caught a train back to Chicago.

The next afternoon in Chicago's Wrigley Stadium, the tension and rivalry between the two clubs seemed to be at new pitch. Ruth was madder than ever at the "windy city" team for what he claimed was chiseling his friend, Mark Koenig. He was determined, to get back at them in some way, preferably by murdering them with his bat.

The game started and in the very first inning, Ruth got a hold of one and sent it out of the park. There were two men on at the time, and this put his team ahead 3-0. Yes, he had hit a home-run for Jonnie and the effect that this was to have on his fight for life, and in his future progress towards

recovery is indeed a remarkable thing. But the climax was yet to come.

The Cubs tied the score at 4-4, and this was the score going into the Yankee half of the fifth inning. It was here that Ruth did one of the most daring things ever attempted on a baseball diamond. The Chicago hurler threw two perfect strikes and Ruth let them both go by, knowing that they were both good balls. As each went by, the Babe held up his finger and said: "That's one" and "that's two,"

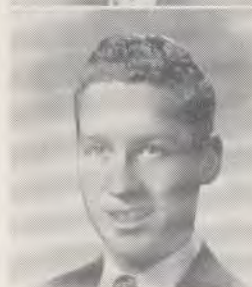
**ROBERT KEEP "Bob" "Gregoire"**

A party, weiner roast and a tobogganing party were among some of our activities.

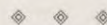
A fudge sale was held in aid of the Red Cross. In the way of Social Service work, a party for the children of an orphanage was held which proved to be a great success.

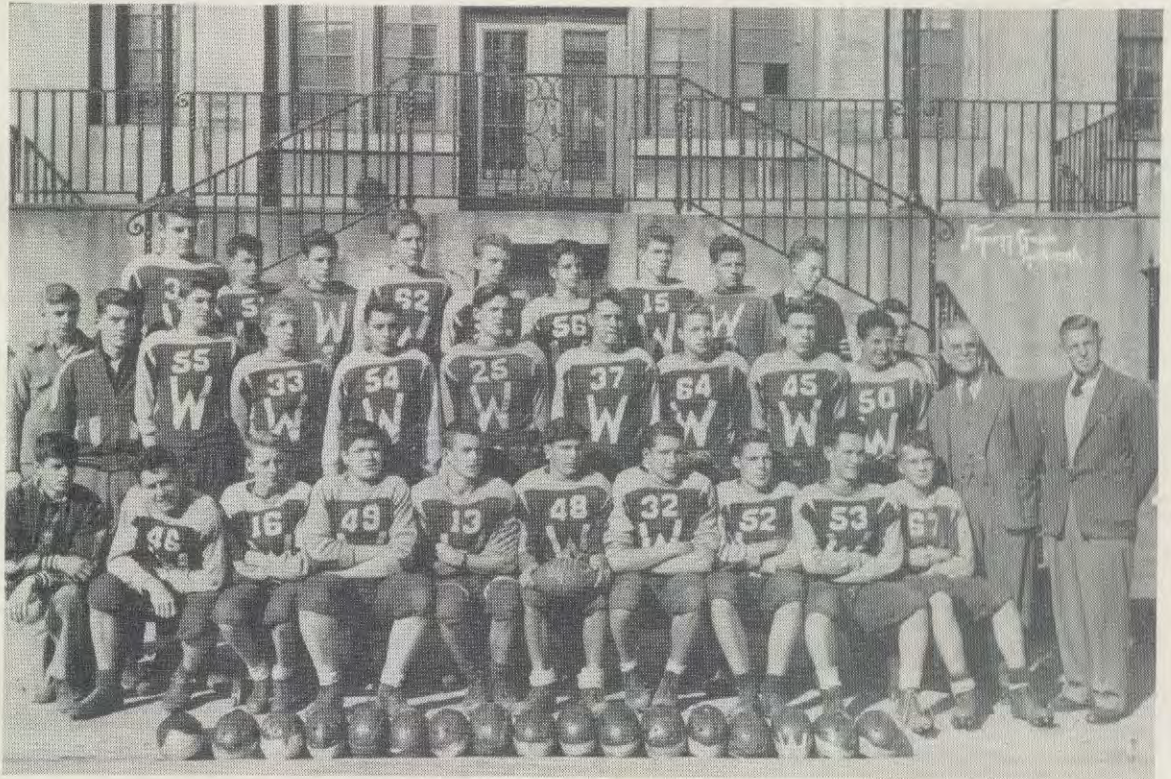

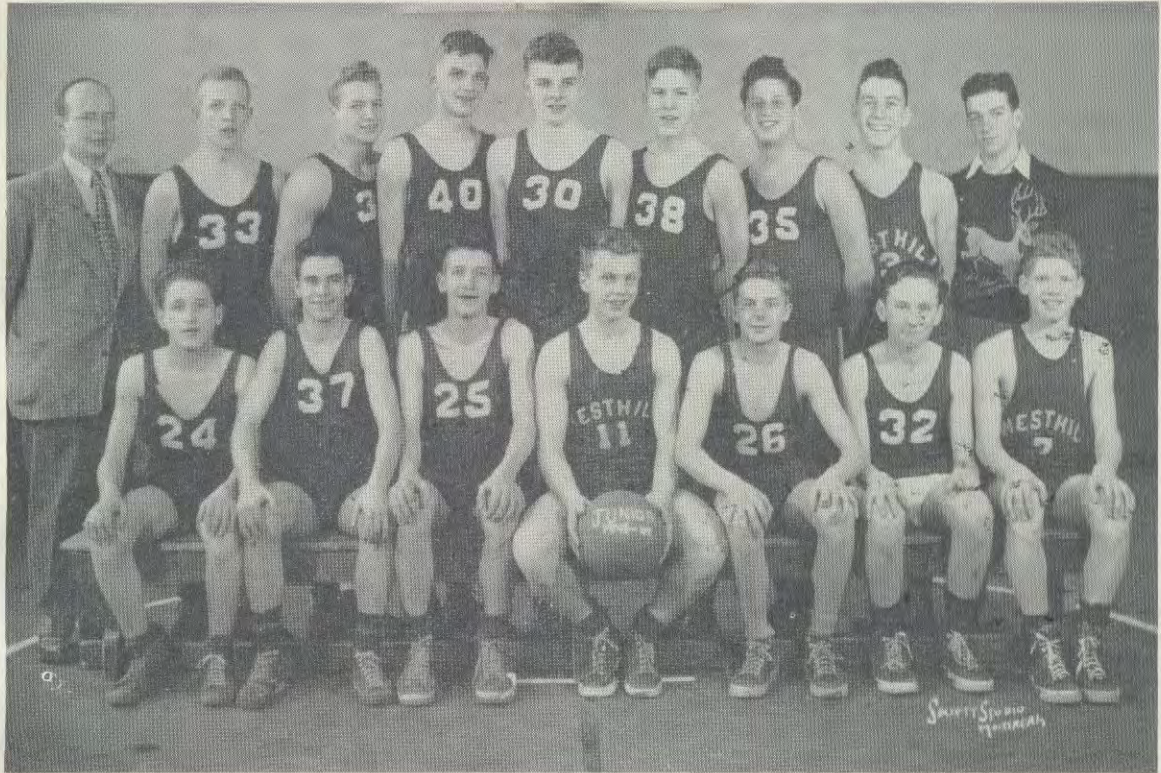


## SWIMMING

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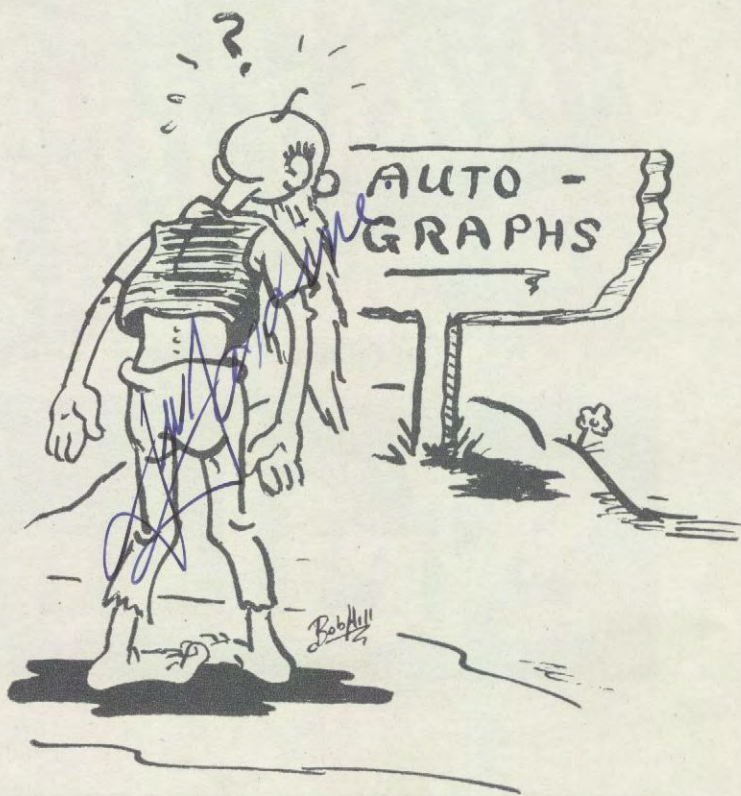
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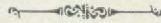
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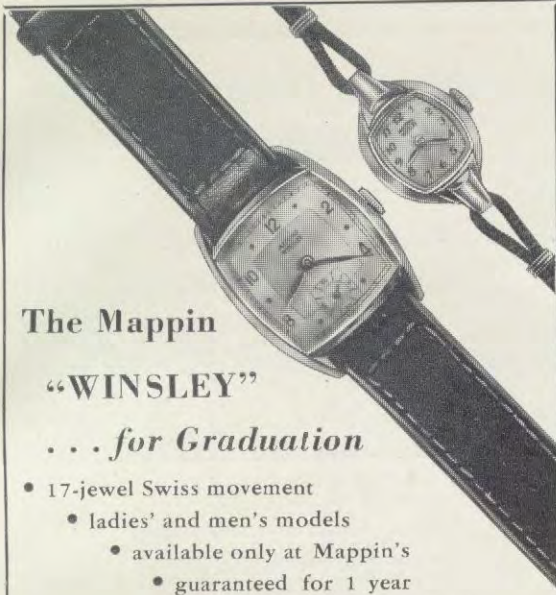
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
