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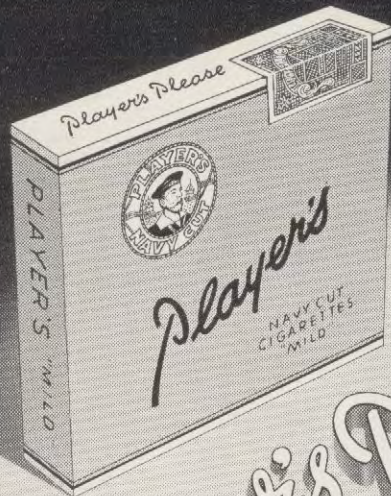
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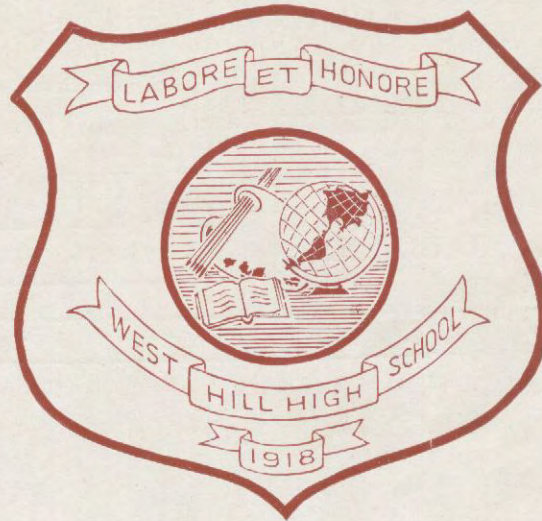

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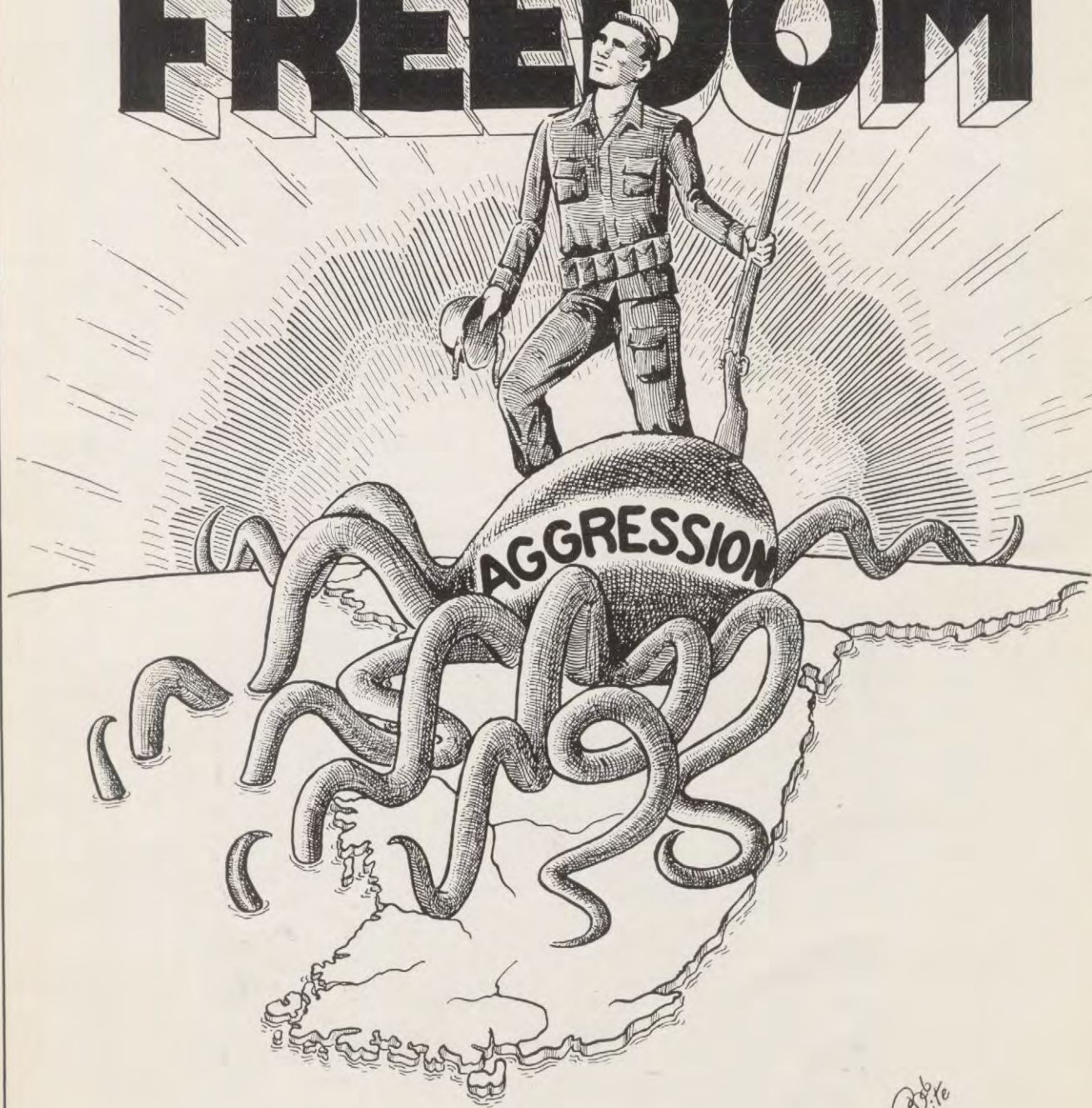

A MESSAGE

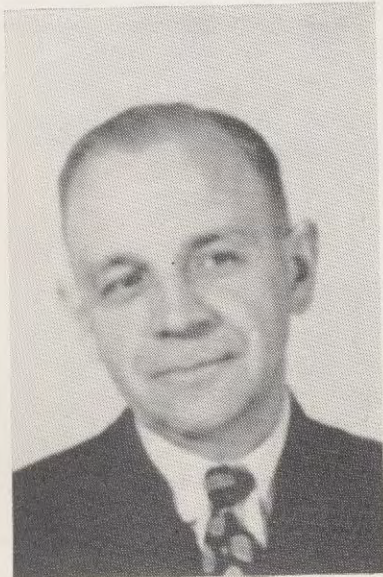

MUSIC—YOURS FOR PLEASURE

Music is both an art and a recreation. As an art, it can only be practised by a few privileged souls, who have added a great number of hours of work to the development of their given talents.

But anyone at all can take part in music as a recreation, just as anyone at all can play a little bridge or golf or tennis, or even learn to read and write. Only a few can become champions at any sport or game, and these are actually artists, even scientists. Only a few people develop into professional writers or speakers, although it is taken for granted that every civilized person acquires the ability to put his thoughts on paper and to talk intelligibly.

You can have fun with music just as you can have fun with other things which you would not think of considering as accomplishments, least of all as professions. The big advantage in music is that you can play, sing or compose it all by yourself. It is not necessary to show off your ability to anyone

just as it is unnecessary to compete with anyone else. So long as you enjoy it, that is enough.

It is strange that more people have not engaged in this more recreational approach to music. Perhaps they have been overawed by the mystery of music, or its apparent mystery, and this attitude has probably been unconsciously encouraged throughout the ages by true lovers of music as well as maestros and critics. The average individual has a curious inferiority complex towards music in general. Perhaps it is that too many people have formed the habit of thinking of music in terms of great performances or great creations. They are all too ready to consider it presumptuous to taking any part in it.

But is there any disrespect to Shakespeare in writing the English language, or even in learning to write the English language? Does the genius of Michael Angelo forbid you from drawing pictures should you feel like it? Are you barred from studying mathematics merely because you will never become a great Einstein?

The practical value of taking part in music is that the participater, no matter how modest he might be, becomes, through this personal experience, a far more understanding and honest appreciator of the work of the true artists. It is a known fact that the gallery at a tennis or golf match is composed mainly of people who have played the game enough to realize what it is all about. Even a little experience at the key-board is bound to increase the enjoyment you get out of hearing a great pianist. If you have experienced the playing of a wood or string instrument, you will undoubtedly gain much more pleasure from the playing of a symphony orchestra.

Actually, one may sit down at the piano and play something in about five minutes with a little guidance, just as you may go out to the golf links and take a swing at the ball and get the sensation of the game immediately. You may learn to read the notes in music far more easily than you learned to speak English, and you may eventually carry a piece of music around and read it for your own pleasure, just as you would read a magazine on a street-car. You will hear the sounds mentally just as you hear the printed words without actually pronouncing them. Thus if you just forget the inhibitions of the past and remember the joys in store, your life will be fuller and happier, for the more types of games, sciences, and people which we understand, the happier our life will be.

THROUGH THE CANADIAN ROCKIES BY TRAIN

It was a bright summer's day as the train sped towards the Rocky Mountains on the last day of a journey across Canada. We flashed through the fields of golden grain to reach Calgary in the early morning. Gleaming in the distance the snow-capped mountains seemed hours away, but suddenly we were right in the midst of them.

Early in the forenoon we arrived at Banff with its magnificent terraced gardens, its beautiful flowers containing every shade of red, blue and yellow set against a sea of green. This setting gives a wonderful first impression of the Canadian Rockies.

Now the mountains are all around, and one can smell the cool scented mountain air. On one side of the train lofty peaks rise into a bright blue sky; on the other can be seen a torrent of water rushing through the valley below.

We hear someone exclaim: "My, doesn't that mountain resemble a castle!". The trainman will tell you, if you stop to ask, that its name has recently been changed from Castle Mountain to Mount Eisenhower in honour of the supreme commander of the Allied Forces.

After looking at mountains for nearly two hours the beautiful water of Lake Louise is reached. Lake Louise is situated in the centre of three lofty peaks. At the far end of the lake is the Victoria Glacier, a solid mass of blue snow and ice which feeds the lake. A profusion of wild flowers deck the shores of the lake.

Leaving Lake Louise the train chugs up the hill until it reaches the Great Divide, the highest point reached by train in the Rockies. Here, a small stream divides, one branch finding its way over the prairies into Hudson's Bay, the other following mountain canyons to lose itself in the warm Pacific. There is a legend that if a person kneels on a stone in the centre and puts one hand in the stream flowing to the Pacific and the other in the stream flowing East and makes a wish, it is sure to come true.

From 5300 feet, the height of the divide, we now begin the twenty-two hour descent to sea level. It is here we go through the famous spiral tunnels and down 1200 feet to the mountain town of Field, British Columbia, beside the Kicking Horse River. Leaving Field, the timber line gradually disappears and the mountains become heavily wooded.

Shortly, we reach Connaught Tunnel which runs through Mount Macdonald and is said to have a roof a mile high. We emerge at the little town of Glacier where it is not uncommon to see thirty feet of snow in the winter.

Soon we reach Revelstoke, situated on the muddy Columbia River. From this point the Columbia River flows south into the United States. West of Revelstoke the rugged beauty changes into apple orchards and rich farmland with luxuriant growth.

A few hours later we enter the breath-taking Fraser Canyon where the train crawls carefully along the treacherous slopes which Simon Fraser first explored.

The salt tang in the air and ocean freighters anchored along Burrard Inlet make us aware that at last we have reached the shores of the blue Pacific.

This interesting trip is terminated at Vancouver, Canada's third largest city, in a beautiful setting of mountain and ocean scenery.

DUCK HUNTING

From the middle of October to the middle of December, the duck's life is one of terror and uncertainty. During this period the duck hunting season is declared "open", and many a misguided human being prides himself in trying to end the lives of the frenzied ducks.

On a crisp, November Monday morning, the duck hunter may be found proudly describing his week-end adventures in hunting. He surveys his audience through glassy eyes, deeply sunken in his head, and encircled by a dull, black colour. He tells of the thousand ducks he saw flying on the horizon of the hundred that flew by him a mile away, and of the five which came within shooting range.

The taste of roast duck is like nothing on earth. A duck hunter, if he is fortunate enough to shoot a duck, will spend an hour cleaning the fowl and another two hours preparing it for the oven. An average roast duck weighs about a pound, and can easily be eaten by one person at a meal. A delicious Brome Lake duckling, weighing six pounds, can be purchased in Eaton's poultry department for four dollars. According to a recent survey, a wild duck costs the hunter who shot it about twenty-four dollars.

A duck hunter will never miss a day's shooting if he can help it. What is the reason for this? I have often asked myself that question, and I have never found a suitable answer. It is certainly not because the hunter likes the taste of roast duck.

There is, however, one possible explanation. Men love planning and organizing and duck hunting requires much of this.

I shall now describe a typical day of duck hunting.

The alarm shattered the stillness at 4:30 A.M. It was turned off with many oaths and much muttering. I looked at the thermometer, which read a chilly 50°. We arose, stoked up the fire, and cooked breakfast. The wind could be heard howling in the trees. It looked like a perfect hunting day. At 6 A.M. we listened to George Bishop give the weather forecast on C.J.A.D. It read wet intermittent snow, high easterly winds, and fog. Between 6 A.M. and 6:30 A.M. we dressed, while listening to Smilin' Ivan and Fiddlin' Slim play a few numbers. After we had put on three heavy shirts, two pair of pants six sweaters, two parkas, and an air-force great coat, a rain coat, two pairs of gloves, a ski hat, and a rain hat, we were ready to leave. The temperature was around 30°, and it was windy and snowing. The outboard was a little more temperamental than usual that morning, and it took a few extra pulls to start it. We reached the island, unloaded the boat and set up the blind on the western end of the island, as the wind was easterly. Our next task was to set out the thirty or more decoys, or wooden ducks. These are anchored in the water about thirty

yards from the blind. They are supposed to represent a flock of feeding ducks. It was just getting light as we settled ourselves in the blind. It had stopped snowing, but there was a heavy fog. Visibility was limited to about two hundred yards.

We sat there for an hour without having any luck. The wind was getting stronger. Suddenly, three of our decoys broke loose from their moorings and started to drift rapidly away. We quickly gave chase in the boat, and wasted the good part of an hour recovering them.

At noon we returned home and had lunch. We busied ourselves with other activities during the afternoon, then returned to the blind and hunted until dark, succeeding in killing one duck. After dismantling the blind, picking up the decoys, and loading the boat, we returned home.

After supper, we all felt very tired, so after stoking up the fire and setting the alarm for 5 A.M. we went to bed. The next morning at daybreak, we were sitting in the blind, anxiously scanning the horizon for ducks.

There are days when the hunter is able to get his legal limit or more. Proir to 1930, a hunter could easily bag a hundred ducks a day, but the western droughts of the early 1930's killed many thousands of ducks, and the hunting has never been the same since. However, wild-life experts claim that the duck population is gradually increasing. This should bring excellent hunting in a few years.

I feel that no matter how stormy the weather is or how few the ducks are, the number of hunters will never decrease. After going duck hunting a few times, a man gets something in his system which he can never get out. It does not matter what the circumstances are, as long as he can walk and lift a shotgun, the duck hunter will be out on opening day every season for the rest of his life. At least, I know I will!

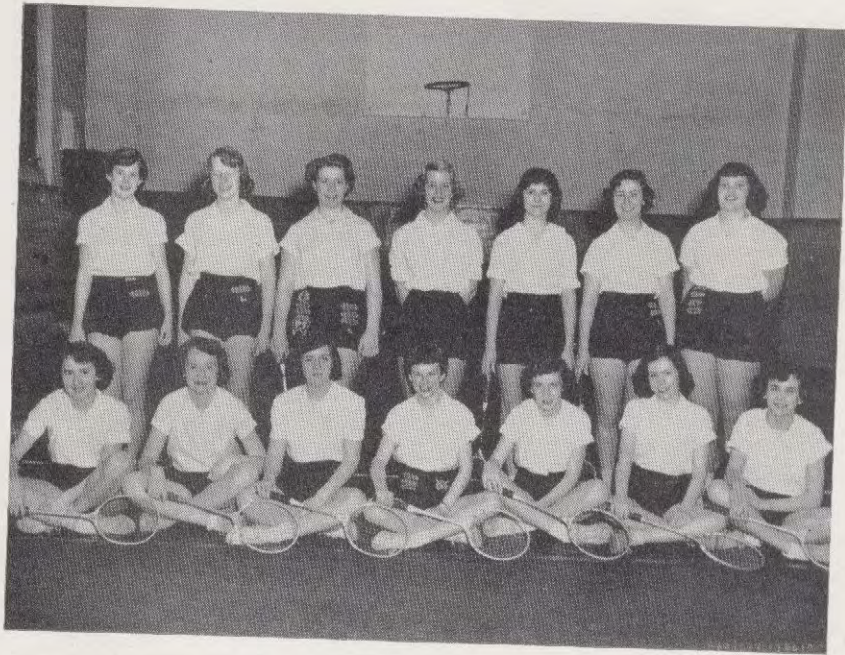
